M IAMI, eleven miles from Globe, is now the terminal of the Gila Valley, Globe & Northern railway. It has a postoffice, express office, telegraph office and a three-trip-a-day train service with Globe. Three months ago Miami had one house; it now has two hundred. Miami has a population of 500. The population of Miami district is 2,000. In the Miami district are the Miami, Warrior, Inspirator, Keystone, Live Oak, Cordova, Boston-Miami, Cactus, Gibson, Duquesne, Schulze Group and Cole Development copper mines, with a capitalization of \$30,000,000. Miami is the distributing point for these mines. The Miami mine now employs 600 men, with a monthly payroll of \$75,000. The first month's freight receipts at Miami were over \$40,000. Miami is growing rapidly. All lines of business are represented. It has a weekly newspaper, The Miami Messenger. Many business opportunities are still open. It is predicted that by January 1, 1911, the population will be 3,000.

HOTEL FOR GIBSON STREET

Mr. Despot stated that work would be started on the building as soon as the grading is completed, which will require several days. The proposed building will be forty feet wide and sixty feet deep, two stories in height. The lower floor will be used for storeroom purposes and the upper portion as a hotel. The front of the building will be brick and stone, the side walls and rear to be of concrete, and the whole to be as near fireproof as possible.

PRIORITY RIGHTS TO WATER ARE SETTLED

Judge Kent Hands Down Decision in Famous Salt River Litigation

GREAT IMPORTANCE TO LAND UNDER DAM

Brought on Demand of Government to Guide Water Apportionment

PHOENIX, Ariz., March 2.—Judge Edward Kent has rendered a decision in the case entitled P. T. Hurley, plaintiff, and the United States of America, intervener, against Charles P. Abbott and four thousand eight hundred others, defendants.

A friendly suit was instituted in 1905 for the purpose of ascertainment and establishment by judicial decree of the rights of all land owners to the use of water from the Salt river for irrigation. When the government undertook the Salt river reclamation project, most of the valley lands were in private ownership, having water appropriations from the Salt river, of varying dates from forty years ago to recent years, together with the complications of changing ownership of the canals, and further complicated by the later and generally accepted doctrine that water is inseparable from land, as enunciated in the reclamation act.

The government made the condition precedent to the undertaking of the reclamation project, that the priority rights of all lands to the use of water should be established before the government designated specifically, the lands to be watered by the project, which designation is to occur on completion of the project. In accordance with that condition, a friendly suit was undertaken, with Hurley, one of the older appropriators, as plaintiff, and all other water users defendants. Testimony has been taken since as to the priority of each tract of land, and the decision now rendered is to be the court record as a basis of all priorities hereafter.

In the successful furnishing of water to lands under the reclamation project, priorities will be valueless, as there will be ample water for all. But in the event of a catastrophe, the destruction of the storage dam or unexpected failure of the water supply resulting in a shortage, the priorities would be valuable in determining which lands are entitled to whatever limited supply might be available.

In its essence, the suit was the demand of the government that the rights of the oldest lands be protected against any possibility of failure of the reclamation project, in which the old lands joined to make possible

co-operation in watering both the old and newer lands. The decision covers thirteen newspaper columns, accompanied by various maps and classification of lands. It is designed by all parties in interest to be a wiping of the slate to date of all previous complexities, and beyond which can be no further resort for litigation.

The suit was brought by Judge J. H. Kibbey, counsel for the Salt River Valley Water Users' association, under its direction. Small opposition to it at first was later dissipated.

ERECTING RIG FOR PROSPECT WELL OF CITY

Active Drilling Should Be Under Way Before Next Week Passes

Within a week, drilling will commence on the new city water well, located at the pumping plant above town. The rig, a frame structure seventy-two feet high, is practically complete and the drilling outfit, which has arrived from Safford, is being put in place.

The only delay which may be occasioned in beginning work on the new well will come as the result of the non-arrival of a drilling cable and a car of coal, to be used in the steam boilers. It is thought that the cable will be here by the end of the week, however, and it should be a matter of only a short time until the car of coal is delivered.

The boiler which was purchased with the outfit will not be used in drilling the new water well, as two steam boilers already in use will furnish the necessary power to carry on drilling operations.

Progress in the erection of the new rig and the installation of the necessary machinery has been rapid and if this pace is continued in sinking the well, it will be only a few weeks until the water bearing qualities of the lower earth stratas at the pumping plant will be determined.

Scenes In Streets of Philadelphia During Great Strike of Trolley Men.



Scenes of great violence marked the opening of the great trolley car strike in Philadelphia. Cars were smashed and burned by the strikers and their sympathizers, and riots in many parts of the city sent scores of persons to the hospitals. In one day a woman and two girls were bit by stray bullets and about 500 persons were arrested. In many cases it was only by the use of powerful streams of water in the hands of firemen that the crowds were dispersed. Several men were badly injured by being hurled against buildings by the force of the currents. The strike arose over the questions of wages, recognition of a carmen's union and the discharge of about 200 union men.

STARR EXONERATED OF CHARGES

Riggie Fails to Substantiate Charge of Threats to Do Injury

On a showing that he has not made threats against L. M. Riggie, that he did not owe Riggie money and that the latter was indebted to him for various small amounts, J. L. Starr of the Starr Tea & Coffee company was discharged yesterday, after a hearing before Judge H. H. Pratt.

Riggie caused Starr's arrest early this week on an application to have the latter placed under a peace bond, claiming that when he attempted to collect money from Starr for services that the latter threatened to kill him, in order to frighten him out of town. In court Riggie failed utterly to substantiate his complaint and when it was shown that Starr had befriended him on numerous occasions and given him money without receiving anything in return, he was completely exonerated by the court.
