GLOBE BAND DANCE WELL ATTENDED

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FORMER GLOBE MAN FOUND DEAD

Body of James Beckerleg Is Discovered Near Road to Wickenburg

James Beckerleg, a prospector who formerly resided in this city, and who is well known in this district, is dead. His body was found in a clump of underbrush on the road near Wickenburg a few days ago. To all appearances, death occurred several weeks ago.

From an examination of the partially decomposed remains, it is believed that Beckerleg died from natural causes. There were no marks of violence on the body and its position indicated that the prospector had been taken sick and had passed away, after lying down near the roadway.

Beckerleg lived in Globe for many years, leaving this district about a year ago. Although not a young man, he had enjoyed good health in the past and the news of his death will be received with much surprise by his friends.

GIRL'S BODY FOUND IN LONELY LAKE

Escaped from Nurses and in Nightclothes Ran Half a Mile to Suicide

CHICAGO, March 12.—Clad only in a nightgown, which she wore when she disappeared, the body of Miss Helena Bloodgood was found today in Lake Carafago by men who have been dragging the bottom for three days.

The body lay twelve feet of water, near a small rustic span known as "Kissing Bridge." It was fully identified by two nurses who had charge of Miss Bloodgood when she fled Wednesday night from the cottage of Leslie Fort, the son of Governor Fort of New Jersey.

A cursory examination by Coroner Hageman gave no indications of murder, and it is supposed the girl ran barefooted through the woods to the lake, half a mile away, and threw herself into the water.

Miss Bloodgood's parents have been scouring the neighborhood in automobiles in search of their daughter. When the body was found they were prostrated.

Miss Bloodgood had been here two weeks under the care of a physician. She has suffered from disordered nerves a number of years and exhibited constant displeasure at restrictions of her liberty. Wednesday night she eluded her nurses and jumped through the window of a lower floor and escaped.

JURY DISAGREES ON AVALANCHE HEARING

Some Held Canadian Pacific Guilty of Negligence

VANCOUVER, B. C., March 12.—Unable to agree upon a verdict, the coroner's jury in the case of the Rogers Pass avalanche which killed sixty-three men, was dismissed today. Some other judicial inquiry will be held. Three of the six jurors wished to bring in a verdict of negligence against the Canadian Pacific railway.
