The Fort Whipple baseball team will play the Phoenix aggregation at the Capital City April 17.

Tempe Rebekahs are arranging for an "Old Maid's Auction," to be held on the evening of April 16.

The executive council of the Arizona Bankers' association will hold a session at Phoenix Saturday.

Fifty cadets of the University of Arizona returned Saturday from a week of camping out in Sabino canyon.

The Hardwick hotel in Phoenix was sold to Nelson Bradley of that city last week, the consideration being \$15,000.

Postoffice Inspector Davis is in Winslow receiving propositions for a new location for the postoffice of that village.

The annual concert of the Phoenix Choral society, which is considered quite a musical event, was held Wednesday evening.

The Mildred Gold Mining company in the Weaver district will begin operations with a new ten-stamp mill in the near future.

Territorial Engineer Giraud says his plans contemplate 3,500 miles of first-class highways to be built in Arizona during the next ten years.

Chief Wiecke, an old and well known Moki Indian, was instantly killed Wednesday morning by a passenger train on the Santa Fe near Winslow.

The latest scare of the Douglas Dispatch predicts the erection soon of a great power plant in Douglas with an electric railway radiating therefrom to the mining districts of Mexico to the south.

Advocates of the assessment plan for paying for proposed sewer extensions at Phoenix appeared before the council at its last meeting with a strong plea for their pet scheme. The plan of payment is the chief obstacle to the immediate building of the new sewers.

Claude Hatfield, the famous California rainmaker, having heard of the drought that is reported erroneously to have devastated most of Arizona, has written to the mayor of Tombstone that he will furnish all the moisture they need down there for the modest sum of \$2,000.

Albert J. Tony, alias Lester Pierre, has been arrested at Mesa charged with burglarizing the New York store at Tempe. He is also charged with marrying a Phoenix widow a few months ago under an assumed name, and of beating and otherwise mistreating her when she discovered his deception.

Lowell saloons won their contention that they should be granted licenses by a decision of the supreme court at Phoenix last week. Licenses had been withheld by the sheriff of Cochise county under the statute that no license should be granted for the op-

eration of a saloon within a mile of the limits of an incorporated city. The supreme court refused to uphold the sheriff on the ground that Lowell is a village in the accepted sense of the term.
