To the Voters of the Second Judicial District.

The undersigned has the honor to inform his fellow-citizens of the Second Judicial District that he has declined further canvassing for the office of District Attorney.

Among other reasons which have prompted him to this step, he need merely mention the necessity, should he be elected, of his violating engagements entered into between himself and certain clients which peculiarity of circumstances require his fulfilling, and that his acceptance of an offer of partnership by an old and valued friend, would render the performance of the duties of the office to the end of the term, almost impracticable. He expects that Elias Safford, Jr. Esq. of Lancaster, N. Y. who will remove to this State in the fall, will with himself engage in a line of practice incompatible with the strict performance of the District Attorneyship during the whole term, as it will interfere both with the Chancery Court at Monticello and the Federal Court at Jackson.

Feeling it his duty not to accept an office which he could retain only a portion of the term, nor to remain a candidate, so long that his friends might not be able to discriminate satisfactorily, as to the gentleman best suited among those who still remain in the field; he thus early announces his *derrière* intention.

He takes this method of returning his thanks to his numerous friends and supporters of all parties for their kind and liberal advocacy of his pretensions. He can assure them that it has not been thrown away but sown upon good ground; it will rise and bloom and bear them the sweet fruit of *gratitude*, so long as there is any thing earthly left of their friend.
