Young Mr. Farrar after receiving a collegiste education at the University of the South and the University of Virginia, was admitted to his father's law-firm and gave promise of a brilliant career. He was of a bright, sunny temperament and had hosts of friends. He was married only a few months to Miss Spearing of New Orleans and his girl-bride survives him.
