PROCEEDINGS TOWN COUNCIL.

The Mayor and Board of Aldermen met in special session at the Town Hall Wednesday, May 26th, 1920, for the following purposes.

To pass ordinance authorizing Mayor and Clerk to borrow \$1000 from the Vidalia Bank and Trust Co. To discuss the sanitary conditions of the town and take necessary steps to remedy present conditions.

To authorize marshal to enforce dog muzzling ordinance. On Roll Call the following answered to their names. P. Hough mayor, B. F. Crook, Jno Dale Jr, C. Moritz, G. A. Murray, aldermen, absent G. P. Bullis.

A quorum being present this meeting was called to order and proceeded and to business.

The following ordinance was introduced and passed to wit: Upon motion duly seconded the Mayor was instructed to notify marshal to kill all dogs found running at large and not muzzled as provided for.

Dr. M. C. Reeves, city Health officer came before the meeting and discussed the sanitary condition of the town and upon his suggestion the clerk was instructed to write Dr. Oscar Dowling, Pres. State Board of Health and obtain from him the name of a good disinfectant and where same could be purchased.

There being no further business the meeting was adjourned.

ORDINANCE NO. 206

An Ordinance authorizing the Mayor and Clerk to issue a Certificate of indebtedness in favor of the Vidalia Bank and Trust Co. for the sum of one Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) being for money borrowed for the purpose of paying current bills and expenses, and pledging the revenue due on September 11th, 1920, from S. B. Mc Neely, Proprietor of the Natchez and Vidalia ferry.

Section 1. Be it ordained by the Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, Louisiana, that the Mayor and Clerk are hereby authorized to borrow from the Vidalia Bank and Trust Co. the sum of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00) and to sign a certificate of indebtedness for that amount, the said certificate of indebtedness to mature on September 11th, 1920 and which is to be paid from the money due on that date to the Town of Vidalia from the Natchez and Vidalia Ferry, and which is hereby pledged to the said Bank as security for the payment of said loan of One Thousand Dollars (\$1,000.00).

This ordinance received an unanimous vote and was declared adopted this 26th day of May 1920.

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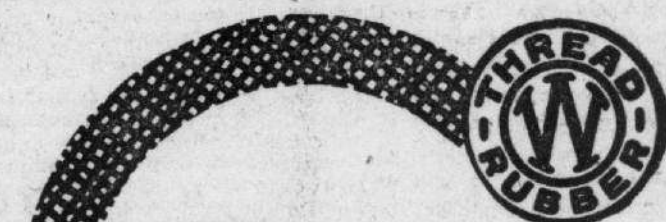
