BOARD OF ALDERMEN.
The Hon. Mayor and Board of Aldermen of the Town of Vidalia, La., met in regular session at the Mayor's Office in the Town Hall Building this Tuesday, August 2nd, 1921, and on roll call the following answered to their names:

Hon. Philip Hough, Mayor, Mrs. M. D. Boatner, Chas. Moritz and G. A. Murray, Aldermen.

Absent: G. P. Bullis and Walter McCrea.

A quorum being present the meeting was called to order by the Mayor and the following proceeding had, to-wit:

On motion, the reading of the minutes of the preceding meeting was dispensed with.

Mrs. Ernest Purcell.

Mrs. Purcell was "at home" to her friends the evening before her departure.

Mr. and Mrs. H. B. Conner have returned from Waterproof.

The Mayor presented his report of receipts and disbursements for the month, which, condensed, shows the following result:

Receipts for month July, \$1,165.50
Disbursements, 1,048.44

Net rec. over disb. July, 116.06
Bal on hand July 1, 1920, 1,681.16

Bal. on hand July 31, 1921, 1,797.22

The committee appointed at the last meeting to obtain estimates of cost of Schillinger walks from Front Street to Ferry, and from High Street to point opposite the High School building on Concordia avenue, reported that they had obtained estimates from three different contractors. These bids were presented to the Board, and on opening same it was found that the bid of C. G. Miller, Agt. Natchez, Miss., was the lowest.

It was moved, seconded and passed that the committee award the contracts to Mr. Miller at the price of his bid providing he would sign a suitable contract and furnish satisfactory bond.

In regard to the walk from Front Street to the Ferry, it was decided to construct part of this walk of concrete, and the balance of wood. The latter to be constructed in such a manner that it can be removed by sections.

On motion, duly seconded and passed, the Town Marshal was instructed to purchase a stop-watch or chronograph, provided he can secure a good substantial one at a price not to exceed \$6.00.

The condition of the dwelling house owned by Mose Bailey, on Third St., was brought to the attention of the Board, and it was the sense of the Board that this building in its present condition is a grave fire menace, and it was moved, seconded and passed unanimously, that the Marshall be instructed to notify the owner, Mose Bailey, to have this building removed within 15 days from this date, and in the event of his failure to comply with this order then the building will be removed by the Town and the expense incurred shall be assessed against the lot.

The Street Committee advised that there were a number of crossings needed and asked authority to lay in a supply of 1000 feet of 2 x 12 timber for use on these crossings. On motion passed unanimously, the street committee was instructed to purchase this quantity of lumber.

The quality of the water now issuing from the mains was next brought up for attention. Quite a few complaints having been received relative to the condition of the water, the matter was referred to the Superintendent of the E. L. & W. W. plant who stated that part of the trouble was a tile well. It appears that the first water pumped was a muddy or reddish appearance which disappears after pump is operated a short time.

Mr. Vance's suggestion was that a trough be constructed to carry off this first water to the gutter, and after the water clears up it would be diverted to the settling tanks.

On motion, seconded and passed, unanimously, Mr. Vance was instructed to construct a suitable trough, and Mr. Moritz was instructed to order an additional 300 feet of lumber for this purpose.

As a further remedy, it was moved, seconded and passed unanimously, that it shall be the duty of the Superintendent of the E. L. & W. W. plant to thoroughly flush all the mains in the town twice monthly, preferably on the second and fourth Thursday of each month.

The week beginning Monday August 1st, and ending Saturday August 6th, being Clean-Up Week for August, the Committee on Law Enforcement stated that notices had been distributed calling attention to this Clean-Up Week, and asked that the Marshall be authorized to employ an extra cart to assist in removing all rubbish and that the Marshall be further authorized to employ a competent person to assist with the inspection of the premises to be made Monday, August 8th. This matter was referred to the proper Committee with power to act.

Another set of sketches for the proposed Town Hall Building, presented for the inspection of the Board. These plans show a two-story building; the second floor of which is shown for use by the Masonic Lodge.

After some discussion of this plan it was decided that the proper thing to do would be to present the matter to the Masonic Lodge at a certain time, if they would co-operate in the erection of a building such as shown by the plans. The matter was referred to Mr. Moritz who stated that he would take the matter up with the Concordia Masonic Lodge and would be ready to report by the first of the week beginning August 8th, at which time a special meeting will be called to arrive at some decision in the matter.

There being no further business before the Board, the meeting was adjourned.
