Their practice ground is in Williams' pasture, on the road between town and behind the white public school grounds. They have invited the Hill City gun club, of Vicksburg, and the Natchez gun club to meet them at Port Gibson and engage in a friendly contest on the 29th.

BERNHEIMERS.

DIED—Friday, May 9th, 1890, at his son's residence in Port Gibson, HENRY WASSEM, Sr., in the eighty-sixth year of his age.

He was born in Oberingheim, Hesse Darmstadt, Oct. 4, 1804, and came to America in 1851, making his home in New Orleans. Thence he removed with his son, Mr. H. Wassem, Jr., to Port Gibson in 1880, residing here from that time till his death. Besides the son just named, he left two daughters, both married, living in New Orleans. He died in communion with the Lutheran church, of which he had long been a member.

The funeral services were held at the residence, corner of College and Coffee streets, at four o'clock Friday afternoon, Rev. Mr. Noll officiating. The pall-bearers were E. M. Barber, P. Kelly, J. McC. Martin, T. Ryan, D. H. Smith, N. S. Walker.

A White Ibis.

Monday afternoon as the gun club were engaged in their regular semi-weekly practice, a large flock of wildfowl flew over, drawing a volley from the gunners. One of the birds fell dead and was secured by Mr. Robert Evans, who noted the following points: the bird weighed two pounds, measured 22 1/2 inches from bill to tail; stood 20 inches in height; measured 36 inches between the tips of extended wings, and had legs 10 1/2 inches long. The bill was slender, curved, and measured 5 inches; a ring of wrinkled reddish flesh marked the junction of the bill with the head; while under the throat this flesh expanded into a sort of pouch. The plumage was of the purest white, except that the three forward wing feathers were tipped for about four inches with dark bluish-green. Legs and feet pale red. The foot was undoubtedly a white ibis (*antelope alba*), otherwise known as the white curlew or Spanish curlew. Though strangers to this locality they are abundant in Florida, and are found to some extent in lower Louisiana. Mr. Evans' bird answered exactly to Wilson's description of the white ibis, measurements, bill, plumage and all, except that only three wing feathers were tipped instead of four as Wilson says. See Wilson's American Ornithology, volume 8.

Mr. Sam. Baguell, of Rocky Springs, and Mr. R. W. Magruder, of Russum, both say that within the past week large flocks of these birds have been seen flying over those localities.

Citizens' Meeting. Pursuant to adjournment from the meeting held Friday evening, 9th inst., (see 1st page) and in obedience also to a call from mayor Colson, the citizens of Claiborne county assembled in the courthouse at 3 o'clock Monday afternoon, May 12th. H. M. Colson was made chairman and C. S. Lobdell secretary. The attendance was rather small, owing to the heavy rain that was falling.

The chairman explained that the object of the meeting was to discuss the question of inviting the "Blue and Gray Association" to spend one day in Port Gibson as guests of this town and county; "and we will begin," added the chairman, "by hearing the report of Messrs. Gordon, Fulkerson and Moore, the committee that was sent to Vicksburg to confer with the managers there."

W. W. Moore, on behalf of the committee, then rose and said that they had had a conference Monday night with the executive committee of the Association in Vicksburg. This body, after a pleasant discussion, had suggested Thursday, the 29th, as the most convenient date for the Port Gibson excursion, as some of the visitors would spend that day at the town of Edwards, thus dividing the excursionists and making it easier for each town to entertain them.

An animated discussion followed, the orators being A. J. Lewis, J. McC. Martin, W. W. Moore, C. T. French, S. Thrasher, R. W. Magruder, B. H. Shafer, T. J. Aby, and others.

The following resolutions were then offered, and on ballot were adopted by an overwhelming majority, there being but one or two dissenting voices: Resolved, That the president of this meeting be instructed to invite the members of the Blue and Gray Reunion Association to visit Port Gibson on the 29th day of May, 1890, in accordance with the previous invitation extended by the Claiborne county memorial association.

Resolved, That the president of this meeting appoint a committee of ten to solicit contributions and subscriptions, which shall be applied in entertaining our guests with becoming hospitality; said committee having power to appoint sub-committees in each neighborhood.

Resolved, That the president appoint a committee of management consisting of five members, who shall have charge of all arrangements necessary for the proper reception and entertainment of our guests.

Resolved, That the public be hereby invited to attend and meet the Blue and Gray Association, which will visit Port Gibson on Thursday, May 29th, 1890. Resolved further, That the ladies of the county be requested to send in basket contributions of such provisions as they may desire to the committee of arrangements.

Resolved, That 500 copies of the foregoing resolutions be printed and distributed by the committee of management. County Executive Committee.

Port Gibson, Miss., May 13th, 1890.

The executive committee met pursuant to call, the following members being present:

Dist. 1, Port Gibson—J. H. Gordon, W. W. Moore; Russum—R. W. Magruder; Bethel—T. F. Daniell. Dist. 2—Lee Hamilton, G. W. Humphreys. Dist. 3—J. A. Regan, S. Bagnell, proxy for W. W. Williams. Dist. 4—J. H. Moore, C. S. Lobdell, W. P. Hughes, proxy for J. B. McMurchy and T. J. Aby, ex. off. Dist. 5—C. H. Phillips. J. G. Spencer was elected chairman and Thos. M. Rea, secretary.

On motion, Resolved that a primary election for the selection of a candidate for the constitutional convention be held by the various clubs of this county Saturday, June 7th, 1890.

On which resolution the vote stood: for primary, Port Gibson, 2; Bethel, 1; dist. 2, 3; dist. 4, 3; total, 9 votes; for a convention, Russum, 1; dist. 3, 3; dist. 5, 1; total, 5 votes.

On motion, a committee of three, consisting of T. J. Aby, W. W. Moore and Sam Bagnell, was appointed to formulate a plan for holding the primary election to select delegates to the state convention and to suggest as to their instructions.

This committee reported the following, which was adopted:

We recommend that the executive committee at this meeting appoint one delegate and one alternate to the state convention to meet in Jackson on the 18th of June, from each district in the county; a majority of whom shall cast the vote of the county for delegates to the state convention from the state at large, said representative from each district to be appointed by the executive committee from the district.

That the several clubs of the county at their meeting to be held on the 7th of June, may by vote designate their choice for delegates from the state at large to the constitutional convention.

We recommend that the executive committee meet on the 9th day of June to receive and count the votes polled at the primary election and to announce the result of the same.

We recommend that the clubs of the county hold their meetings not later than 10 o'clock nor later than 6 o'clock on the 7th day of June.

That the president of each club shall appoint the tellers at the election who shall make a tally sheet and send same to the executive committee on the following Monday.

That only known democrats shall be entitled to vote at said primary election.

Resolved, That the chair appoint a committee of three democrats, consisting of J. McC. Martin, W. W. Moore and A. K. Jones, to draft a constitution and by-laws for the future government of the executive committee, to report at the next meeting of the executive committee to be acted upon before any other business is transacted.

Resolved, That any known democrat may vote at any club precinct in the county provided such voter shall write his name and district on the back of the ticket so voted.

Resolved, That the vote of the delegates to the state convention be apportioned as follows: District No. 1, 5 votes and 3 votes each for the other four districts.

The following delegates were then appointed to the state convention: Dist. 1—W. W. Moore; R. W. Magruder, alternate. Dist. 2—G. W. Humphreys; B. H. Morehead, alternate. Dist. 3—T. J. Hutchins; H. C. Drexler, alternate. Dist. 4—T. J. Aby; M. R. Jones, alternate. Dist. 5—D. J. Cannon; W. W. Winters, alternate.

Resolved, That we now adjourn to meet on Monday, June 9th, at 11 o'clock, a. m. THOS. M. REA, Secretary.
