Republican County Convention.

The Republicans held a county convention here last Saturday to appoint delegates to the State and Judicial conventions. There was a full attendance, and it was the general remark of the spectators, except Pap and his rounders, that it was the most decent, orderly and intelligent Republican county convention ever held in Nevada county.

It was composed almost entirely of colored men, Mr. T. J. Simpson, of Boughton, Sam Gee, Thos. Willingham, G. W. Kizer, and Carl Powers, as proxy for Sam Grayson (minor), of Missouri township, being the only white delegates.

Squire B. G. Bryant, of Leake, presided as chairman, and Chas. A. Oliver acted as secretary.

B. G. Bryant, S. T. Boyd, Ed Hartsfield, and W. B. Hawkins, the member of the U. L. lecture bureau, were elected delegates to the Republican State Convention, to be held at Little Rock on the 9th inst.

C. A. Oliver, S. B. Gee and Ed Hartsfield were elected delegates to the Judicial convention to be held at Washington on the 11th inst.

Our distinguished Postmaster started to shy his castor at the convention by declaring with his usual candor that he wanted delegates sent to Little Rock who would do whatever the State convention said do—who would support the U. L. State ticket if it should be endorsed by the convention. He had his mouth wide open to say more, but Chairman Bryant sternly commanded him to sit down, whereupon his jaws came together like a steel trap, and he very promptly arose up and sat down with a considerable thud. He slapped himself on the leg with his hat, jerked his head violently to one side, laughed very loud, and remarked that he did not want anybody to think he was trying to run the convention.

A new central committee was appointed, and after the adjournment of the convention the new committee organized by electing B. G. Bryant chairman, and S. T. Boyd secretary. The committee also called a county convention to meet in Prescott on the 26th inst., to consider the matter of putting out a county ticket.

A Murderous Burglar.

Mr. Albert Milner, one of Prescott's most prominent citizens, was shot and badly wounded by a burglar last Friday night. When Mr. Milner awoke and discovered the burglar in his room, he sprang out of bed and grappled with him. They scuffled from the room, and out on a back gallery, where the burglar opened fire with a revolver. After several shots had been fired by the burglar, Mr. Milner threw him over the banister to the ground below. Rising up quickly he fired another shot, the ball passing entirely through Mr. Milner's leg just above the knee, breaking it badly. The burglar then escaped, and has not yet been apprehended, and no clue has been found that might lead to his detection, except his hat, which he lost in the room. It is a low-crowned, narrow-brimmed Stetson fur, No. 7; but little worn, and shows signs of having been stretched. It was sold by Abinger, Coles & Co., of Dallas, Texas. Mr. Milner is being treated by Drs. Wingfield, Arnold and Harris, and is so far doing well. The people are much aroused by this great crime, and the officers appear to have made diligent effort to apprehend the guilty party.
