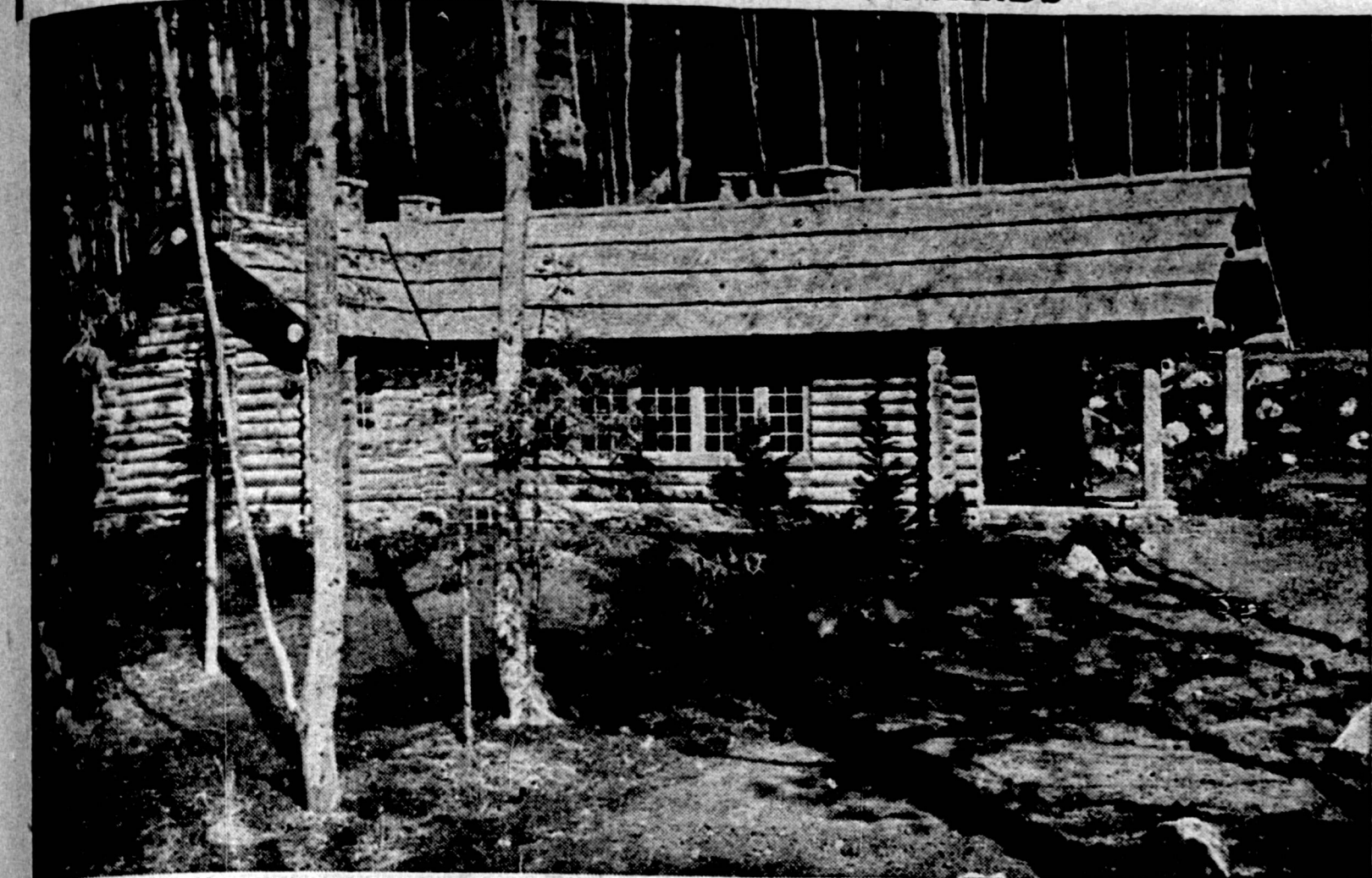


STATE PARKS INVITE THOUSANDS

Mr. and Mrs. Leo Glassner were Sunday dinner guests of Mr. and Mrs. Clint Glassner.

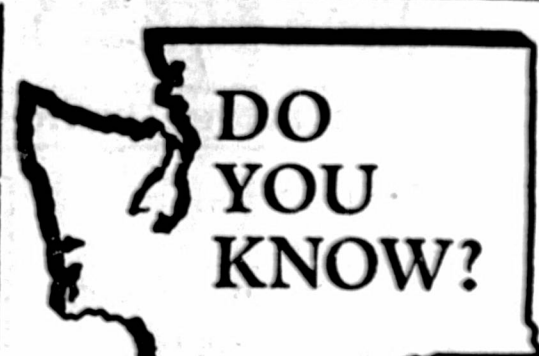

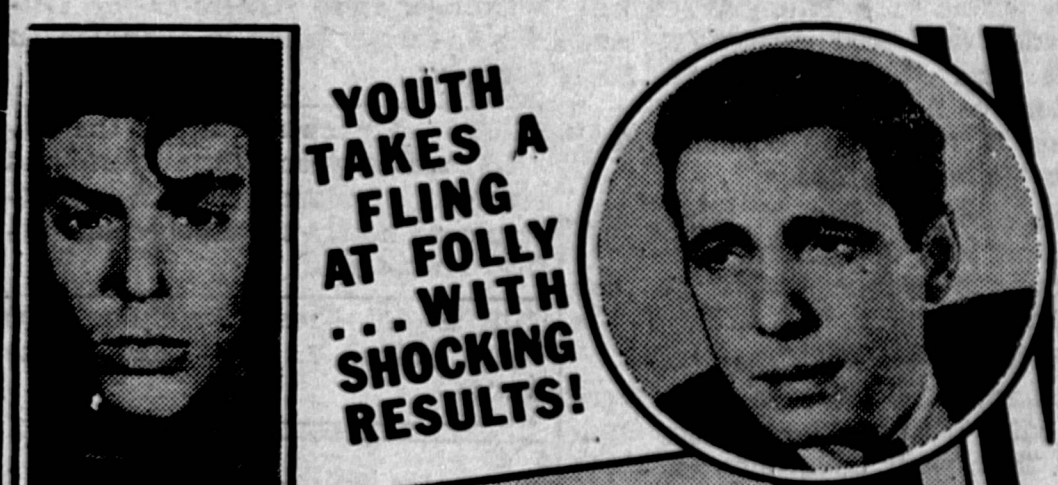
