Looking for historical dates occurring within April, May and June, the Washington State Progress Commission found among many others, the following:

Mount Baker was discovered and named on April 30, 1792, by Captain George Vancouver. In May of 1792 Townsend was named. Mount Rainire also was named in May, 1792 by chard was named on Thursday, May 29, 1792, the man who discovered the location being named Orchard.

On June 15, 1846 the international boundary was fixed between the State of Washington and Canada, the final settlement occurring in the fall of that year.

The first American home was established in the Puget Sound region at Nisqually in June, 1840 and on June 1, 1840 the largest missionary group arrived at Vancouver, Washington.

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
