

One More Chance For Youth to Get Flying Schooling

New ground school classes now being formed for CAA

Whether Eastern Washington young men have the opportunity to win a flight scholarship entitling them to a private pilot's license at government expense depends solely upon the enrollment of competitors for the summer session pilot training ground school, which is being sponsored by the Pasco Chamber of Commerce and conducted by School District No. 1, according to the latest information received by C. L. Booth, coordinator.

Applications are being received from towns outside of Pasco and Kennewick in greater proportion than from these two places, and should the enrollment justify the Civil Aeronautics Administration allowing a third ground school for this district, it likely that again the free flight scholarships will be won by those boys who must make

the longer trips to get to the classroom.

Fifteen boys and one girl started their flight instruction on June 25 as a result of their competitive standings in the spring session ground school completed May 27. No more girls are accepted for competitive enrollment, but there is no restriction of any kind for non-competitive enrollment in the ground school. Tuition for the 72 hours of ground instruction covering civil air regulations, meteorology and navigation is ten dollars, and if the student successfully passes the government-supervised test at the end of the course any person who has completed the test can apply for his private pilot's license after logging the required number of hours without having to take any further written tests. This concession is helping a number of fliers who, for one reason or another, cannot be competitively enrolled in the course.

Any information on ground school will be cheerfully furnished at the office of the superintendent of the Pasco schools, and young men between the ages of 19 and 26 (but not 26) are urged to take advantage of this opportunity to get free flight training at government expense. Draft boards in Franklin and Ben-

ton counties are deferring competitors who have enrolled in the summer session, and should a competitor be awarded a scholarship, he will be further deferred until the completion of his instruction in flight.

With but two ground schools for non-college students in the state, and the other at Bremerton, the administrators of this school are very anxious to keep this school here until every boy from Eastern Washington who is interested in aviation has had a chance to enroll.

After filling out a preliminary application blank boys are asked to make an appointment with Dr. J. L. Greenwell, who is officially designed by Washington, D. C., and get his physical examination completed. Blanks for enrollment are at Mr. Booth's office in the Pasco high school building.
