**Purple Heart Awarded to Victim of German Mine**

Injured when he stepped on a German mine during the invasion of southern France, Pvt. f/c Roy W. Fisher was recently awarded the Purple Heart at the Bushnell general hospital at Brigham City, Utah, where Fisher is being treated.

As a messenger for an anti-tank company, attacking about 30 miles from Nice, Fisher was on a reconnaissance mission with four other men when he was wounded. They had been sent out to locate a possible emplacement for their artillery, in order to shell a Nazi fort.

Fisher first went to Italy and then was assigned to the task force which invaded France from the Mediterranean side.

His wife, Jean, has been living with her sister, Mrs. Paul Derting, of Kennewick, during his overseas duty.

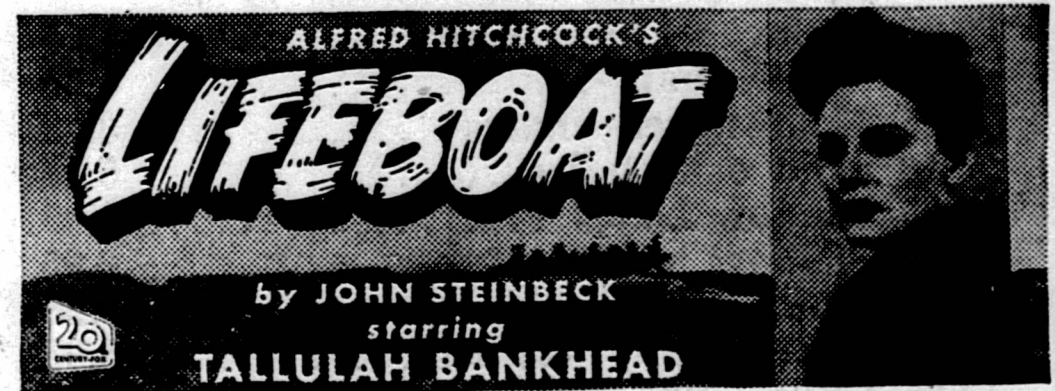
