

Speed and Flash Not Enough to Save Opening Game for the Lions

Kennewick High school showed plenty of strength and flash in spite of taking the short end of a 13-6 score in the opening football game at Burlington last Friday night.

Burlington scored in the first four minutes of play after blocking a Lion kick and recovering on the five yard line. On the next play Burlington scored and the conversion was successful.

The situation was reversed late in the first quarter when a Burlington kick was blocked and Kennewick recovered on Burlington's 20 yard stripe. From there Reavis connected with two passes and Elliott went over on three running plays. The try for point failed.

Burlington's second score came in the fourth quarter on an end-around from their own 45 yard line which was good for 15 yards followed by an off tackle that clicked for the score.

Both Burlington touchdowns were made by Peth, a speed merchant back, who is, incidentally, a nephew of E. S. Black, superintendent of Kennewick schools.

The second quarter was a ding-dong battle marked by a Burlington pass that took them from their own 32 yard line to Kennewick's 30. Running plays from

there took the ball to the eight yard stripe at half time.

Burlington also completed a pass in the third quarter that was good for 50 yards.

Kennewick, however, outgained Burlington throughout the game.


