A teaspoonful will cause choking aud coughing for several minutes in a throat unaccustomed to swallowing the powerful stuff. But there are men in the territory who drink two or three bottles a day with apparent satisfaction to their educated stomachs. More Jamaica ginger is sold in Indian territory than in half a freeze up anyway upon the slightest dozen states where whiskey selling is licensed.

> Red Ink is another favorite territory tipple. This is not a nickname for something else. The ordinary red ink which the bookstores of the states sell for writing purposes is a beverage in part of that country. The ink drinker of cultivated taste will buy bottles by the half dozen at a time and swallow the contents with relish. Essences which sell elsewhere for flavoring purposes are used as drinks under this civilization. Anything that has a basis | cellar. of alchol is in demand.
