THE CITY COUNCIL

Transacted the Usual Batch of Business Last Evening.

The petition of A. Jonas for larger water main was granted.

Supt. Linn reported water main across the Chehalis river as leaking about 5,000 gallons an hour, and the question of accepting the work was discussed. The contractors claimed the leaks were in the defective joints furnished by the city, and that they had filled the letter of their contract. The subject was referred to a committee of the whole this evening, and it is likely the matter will find its way into the courts before it is closed.

The clerk reported water collections for May as \$2,866.67.

Supt. Linn reported the following for the water department for May: Taps made, 14; operating expense, \$612; extensions, \$9,690.

Police Judge Bush reported \$162 in fines collected in May.

The street superintendent reported numerous streets and sidewalks requiring repair, which were referred to the street committee.

A Semmen offered to put a coat of tar, or tar and sand, on street crossings, at 87 and 95 cents per square. Referred to committee.

The attorney reported on the matter of doing public work in excess of \$500 without letting contracts, saying that bids should first be called for and contracts let, unless the council thought it could be done cheaper by the department. This was also made a subject for the committee of the whole tonight.

The bond of F. A. Keasall, sewer contractor, was approved.

A petition was read complaining of sloughs in South Aberdeen being filled up with sawdust. Referred to a committee with power to act.

Saloon licenses were granted to M. Goldsmith and Willie & Larson.

GRAYS HARBOR DAY

AT PORTLAND EXPOSITION.

Quite an enthusiastic meeting of representative citizens from Aberdeen, Hoquiam and Elma, was held Monday evening in the Commercial club rooms at Hoquiam, to consider plans for Grays Harbor Day, June 26, at the Portland exposition. Although Montesano and Cosmopolis were not represented, it was understood that those towns are heartily in favor of a movement to gain all possible publicity for Chehalis county out of the occasion.

It is the intention to run a special train, leaving Grays Harbor Sunday afternoon, June 25, having a reduced rate of fare, and allowing the passengers to return at will. A general discussion upon methods of advertising was had, and the unanimous expression was that the best advertisement we could have would be a large and enthusiastic crowd attend the fair that day, and every man be a booster. Badges will be prepared, as well as printed material descriptive of the county, for distribution.

The matter of arrangements was referred to a committee of one from each town, with the president of each commercial organization as ex-officio members. The following is the committee: Fred Futh, Aberdeen; W. E. Campbell, Hoquiam; A. G. Wellington, Cosmopolis; Frank Byles, Montesano, and F. L. Lewis, Elma.

The meeting adopted a resolution requesting the county commissioners to appropriate \$500 to cover cost of advertising, but that august body turned that down Tuesday, so that funds will have to be provided by private subscription, the appropriation being made as follows: Aberdeen \$150, Hoquiam \$150, Cosmopolis, Montesano and Elma \$50 each. These sums are to be collected at once and remitted to the committee, which will meet tomorrow evening at Eiks hall, Aberdeen, to organize and push along the arrangements.

RED MEN'S CARNIVAL.

Arrangements are completed for a Week of Sport.

Aberdeen's big spring carnival, under the auspices of the Red Men, is being thoroughly exploited, and is getting widespread publicity. The Seattle, Tacoma and Portland papers are boosting it, and the attendance from outside promises to break all records. The public wedding, baby show and country store, together with the band concerts, parades, illuminations and other special features will all be seen, in conjunction with the big Nat Reiss Carnival company, which is a veritable world's fair "pike" in itself.

The streets are beginning to assume a gala appearance with a lavish display of gay carnival colors under the direction of Chairman C. V. Loy, who has a corps of expert decorators going a rapid pace.

Wednesday—"Grays Harbor Night," athletic contests, etc.

Friday—"Lumbermen's Day," log rolling contest, 1:30 p. m. "Cupid Night" public wedding 9 p. m.

Saturday—"Children's Day." Prize baby show at 3 p. m. Mardi Gras night, closing night. Fun, Festivity and Frivolity. Everybody en-masque.

FACTORY INSPECTION LAW.

Labor Commissioner Hubbard Sends Out Instructions.

Charles F. Hubbard, state labor commissioner has sent out to all manufacturers of the state a circular of instruction calling their attention to the new factory inspection law which goes into effect today. The law is a very important one and is concisely and clearly explained to the manufacturers in Commissioner Hubbard's communication. It reads as follows:

"OLYMPIA, June 3, 1905.

"The new factory inspection law passed at the last session of the legislature will go into effect June 8, 1905, and as a good deal of inquiry has been made at the office of the state labor commissioner as to the manner in which the inspection will be conducted and the requirements of manufacturers, I beg leave to submit the following brief instructions:

"As soon as possible after June 8 have your mill, in your judgment, up to the requirements of the law. Send your check to the state treasurer for \$10 as an annual inspection fee. Then make application to the commissioner's office for inspection. He will acknowledge the same. Then upon the inspector presenting himself to inspect your premises, first show your receipt of fee the date and number of which the inspector will make a note of, and notify the commissioner's office immediately after the inspection is made. If your mill is found in the judgment of the inspector, to conform with the law, a certificate will be forwarded you from the commissioner's office, dated the same as your receipt of fee which entitles you to a year's protection from the date thereof.

"The regular certificate will be accompanied by sufficient copies of same to be posted up with the law. After an inspection has been made the inspector will notify you verbally if, in his judgment, your mill conforms with the law or not; if not he will explain what should be done. If you object he will notify the commissioner's office in writing, who instead of granting a certificate will notify you in writing of the requirements, then you can proceed to submit the same to a board of arbitration as provided by law.

Copies of the original law will be furnished to all desiring them.
