TRUNK DOES NOT FURNISH A CLUE

CHARLES SCHMIDT'S MURDER IS NOW CONCEDED BY POLICE
—CONTENTS OF HIS TRUNK APPARENTLY UNTOUCHED

That Schmidt was murdered for his money is now generally conceded by the police. To support this theory, Mrs. Schmidt has a letter from her husband written in Seattle on May 15, in which he states that he was going to Kirkland to look at some land in that section. From the chambermaid's own lips comes the link to fit this bit of information. Schmidt purchased a pair of bib overalls just before he disappeared, something that he never wore before in his life. His trunk was sent somewhere the afternoon before he was supposed to have started for Juneau. Schmidt stopped at the hotel that night.

Whether his plans were changed and he was drawn into a network of the murders' cunning may never be known, but little by little the truth is being unfolded and Chief of Police Delaney has promised Mrs. Schmidt every aid possible to prove her husband's death.

"I don't care one snap about the insurance and I wish you would just say that for me," said Mrs. Schmidt this morning, "but I would like to know whether or not my husband is dead and I do not intend to leave this part of the country until that fact has been established one way or the other. I can support myself and I am not afraid to work."

In a vain endeavor to establish himself as a sleuth, City Detective Adams takes for himself the credit of unearthing the trunk belonging to Charles Schmidt from its hiding place at Pier A of the Pacific Coast company. The trunk would never have been found had not The Star

brought the matter before the public. As stated before, the head bagged-master of the Pacific Coast company first reported the finding of the trunk to The Star and afterwards to the police department.

Local papers have stated that it was through the personal efforts of Detective Adams that the important clue was obtained.

Mrs. Schmidt will secure permission from the police to remove the trunk, which is now held as evidence, although the only evidence the trunk can possibly furnish in the case is that its contents were apparently undisturbed when found. That the trunk was shipped out of the city and then returned cannot be conclusively proven, and the only thing to suggest this is the little bit of pasteboard on one end of the trunk showing that the trunk had been received at Portland for storage on August 2. It was returned to Seattle late in August, or about September 1. It is Mrs. Schmidt's intention to examine carefully every article in the trunk.

A careful examination of the coroner's records dating from May 29, the date Schmidt disappeared, shows that from the long list of unknowns, none of them tally as closely as the body found near Smith's cove. As has been stated before, in many respects the body found there tallies closely with that of the missing Schmidt and, while the examination at the morgue was the best possible under the circumstances, still the discrepancies may be accounted for by the advanced stage of decomposition of the body when viewed by those who had the case in charge.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 17.—There is not a scintilla of truth in the "pipe" story sent out by the correspondents of Eastern Washington papers that Gov. Mead has a senatorial bee in his bonnet. He is too shrewd a politician to allow any such pretensions to damn his early career in state politics.

He was somewhat piqued when he heard that rumors to the effect that he was to be one of the "dark horse" candidates and that he had at some time to somebody whispered that he would make the race.

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 17.—A bill calling for direct primaries throughout the state has already been prepared and will be introduced in both the upper and lower houses of the legislature as soon as the smoke of the senatorial battle has cleared away.

The bill is now safely stowed away in the inside pocket of its sponsor. He will not allow his name to be divulged at present nor give the correspondents an inkling of the provisions of the measure, for fear that too much publicity at this time will precipitate a strenuous opposition to it too early in the game.

But that it will be introduced and that a hard fight will be made against it there is not the least doubt in the world. And it will require the finest sort of political diplomacy to get this measure spread on the statute books.

It is believed that one of the hardest fights of the session will be made against this bill.
