Do you believe in dreams and fairies? Chauncey Olcott does—almost.

It was between the first and second acts of "Ragged Robin," in which he is appearing this week at the Metropolitan that the singer of Irish ballads and player of Irish minstrel songs had a few moments in which to discuss his beliefs regarding elves and fairies and dreams. In "Ragged Robin" he believes in all of them.

"And in real life," he said last night, "I'm not such a skeptic, either. I heard considerable about the fairies when I was a youngster—my mother was Irish and she told the stories to me. They became—well, ALMOST real, and have ALMOST remained so. Then my wife," he added—"Mrs. Olcott, is quite whimsical. And she likes to think she believes in fairies. Nice, isn't it? You know, she wrote the play of 'Ragged Robin'."

"About dreams," he went on to say, "I think there might be something in dreams sometimes. I think they might be a little more certain," he laughed, "even than the fairies. I'll tell you an experience of mine that makes me think so."

DREAMED OF TRIP TO UNITED STATES
"Twenty-eight years ago I was singing in musical comedy in England. I had gone to that country to study after playing in 1881 with Haverty's minstrels in America, and later with Denman Thompson and McCall's opera."

"I liked England. I intended to remain there, for I was considered a success in that country. Well, one night I had a dream. I thought I was sailing to a foreign country, where I would remain to sing, and where I would meet even greater success, never returning to play in England again."

"Now I had no thought of such a thing. I intended to remain in England. But that same year I made a journey to New York state, where I
