New Kinds of Nickel-Steel.

Prof. R. H. Thurston, of Cornell university, calls attention to a curious variety of nickel-steel alloys, recently invented in France, which he thinks may have more importance for the world than the form of nickel-steel that has given us the modern battleship. The new alloys are practically nondilatable, that is, their dimensions do not alter with ordinary changes of temperature. Thus, a pendulum of constant length can be made, and already the new material is employed in making clocks and watches to run true in both winter and summer. For measuring instruments of precision, like those employed in geodetic surveys, these alloys are particularly suited. The inventor, Monsieur Guillaume, is also experimenting with nickel-steel as a substitute for the carbon filament of the ordinary incandescent lamp.

Whales Are Increasing.

Whales are increasing rapidly, as it no longer pays to kill them. Twenty-five years ago 400,000 barrels of whale oil was produced annually. This has now fallen to about 60,000.
