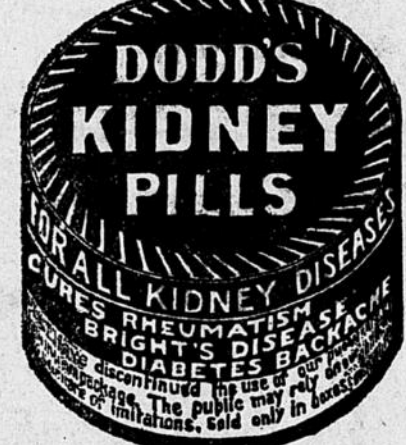
### Efficacy Plus Prayer.
