HISTORICAL REMINISCENCES.
Paper Read at the Silver Anniversary of the Steele County Sunday School Association, by C. G. Boise, May 8th, 1913.

Mr. President, Delegates of the Convention, Ladies and Gentlemen: It is indeed a pleasure to me, to have this opportunity of meeting with you and thus participating in the celebration of this Twenty-fifth Anniversary of the Steele County Sunday School Association. Having been present at its birth and for nearly a score of years directed its destiny, its marked success on thus reaching its twenty-fifth milestone, with its never flagging progress, is thus a source of mutual congratulation.

In the early eighties, when North Dakota was being settled, those who were the pioneers, realized that education was necessary as a means for
