ALBANY, N. Y., June 30.—State Commissioner of Labor John McMackin has issued the following review of the conditions of labor in this state during the first quarter of 1902: "The amount of idleness among the waybox of New York labor organiza-

tions was far smaller than it has been in the months of January, February and March in any recent year. Herefore at least 10 per cent of trade unionsts have been lide during those months, but this year the proportion has fallen to 6.2 per cent. The average number of days worked by the men increased from 58 in 1897 to a little less than 67 in 1901 and 67.3 in 1902. The average engines of organized works.

creased from 58 in 1891 to a little less than 67 in 1901 and 67.3 in 1902. The average carnings of organized workingmen increased in about the same ratio, having been \$155 in the first quarter of 1807, a little less than \$183 in 1901 and a little over \$184 in 1902.
