THE COUNTY LINE-UP

Nominations for the various county offices close nine days from to-day. Announcements have been made so far for every office in the gift of the people of the county with the exception of the legislature and prosecuting attorney, coroner and surveyor. The two latter in all probability will not furnish much contest but in the other three offices there is liable to be a lively campaign.

For prosecuting attorney there will probably be two aspirants. There are only three men in the county eligible to the office and of these two will be candidates and the third, the present incumbent, declares that he will not accept it. P. C. Williams will undoubtedly be a candidate and will be opposed by a man hailing from the eastern end of the county.

With regard to the offices of Senator and Representative, there has been considerable discussion but no formal announcements are yet to be seen in our column set aside for that purpose.

William Healy wants to be senator but in all probability will not make the race at the primaries against Dow Dunning on the Democratic ticket. Simon Harris, the present senator from Owyhee, is expected to make the race for the Republicans but has not so far declared himself, and no one has as yet declared a desire to step into Dunning's shoes in the House.

All the other offices contain a fine list of would-be officers for the voter to take his choice. For sheriff there are at present no less than seven formal announcements, including Messrs. Hanson, Hore, Rock, Pinkston, Rogers, Mullenix and Albert.

For assessor Charlie Harvison will fight it out in the primaries with the present incumbent, Bert Townsend, both Republicans and to make the thing interesting an-

other Republican announces himself this week in the person of Fay O. Mitchell of Wilson. No one has as yet appeared on the Democratic ticket.

The same conditions apply to the Probate Judgeship, for which R. S. Hawes and Commissioner Grete will race in the Republican primaries.

For School Superintendent, Mrs. Jennie Farrer Avery, the present incumbent, is the only candidate so far.

For Treasurer up to date there appears to be no contest at the primaries, as there are only two candidates, Margaret Canavaney and Oro B. Weymouth, one a Democrat and the other a Republican.

For Commissioner in the First District, that including Silver City, Lucius Gardner is so far the only announced candidate. He is a Republican.

The Second District, now commanded by Mr. Gifford, presents four candidates, J. M. Morgan of Morgan and W. R. Harrison, of Reynolds, both Republicans, and Ernest Bedford and A. L. Knight, Democrats.

In the Third District F. H. Laird of King Hill, a Republican, is unopposed so far.

The situation as outlined may be materially changed by late announcements; as this section of the Nugget went to press on Tuesday.

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Epidemics of So-Called Influenza

Since the pandemic of influenza in 1889-90, when within one year the whole civilized world was afflicted with the contagion, there have been lesser outbreaks at irregular intervals in most centers of population. These epidemics of sore throat and bronchitis have usually been called influenza or "la grippe," because of the characteristic contagiousness of the infection, the persistence of the symptoms, and the tendency of prostration and mental depression. But this diagnosis has not been satisfactorily confirmed by bacteriologists. In the great pandemic, Pfeiffer and others found in the nasal and bronchial secretions "pure cultures of the influenza bacillus in all complicated cases." Subsequent reports seem to indicate that the influenza bacillus is a common invader of the air-passages in a large group of other diseases, notably whooping cough, phthisis and measles. There is no evidence that this bacillus is more prevalent in the local epidemics of influenza than in the ordinary catarrhal infections. A recent epidemic of "septic sore throat" in Boston was studied by Richardson and others. They traced the contagion to infected milk. A study of an influenza epidemic among children in Berlin and

of the recent epidemic of sore throat in Chicago have demonstrated as the exciting agent a germ of peculiar characteristics different from the influenza germ. The Journal of the American Medical Association points out that these three epidemics, occurring during the last year in widely separated communities, have all been caused by the same germ. It is to be hoped that in the future such epidemics in various cities will be more systematically and carefully investigated.
