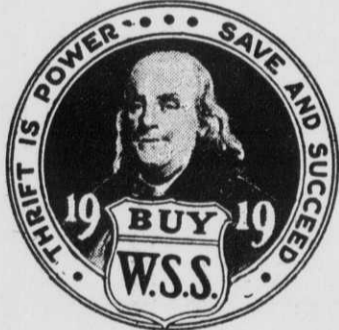

Edelblute In Washington.

Washington, D C July 9 —Colonel W. H. Edelblute of Rathdrum, who returned from overseas a few weeks ago, and is stationed at Camp Dix, N. J., called on Idaho senators and representatives today while here on leave. He expects to be mustered out soon and to return home. He was called into service in 1917, as colonel of the Second Idaho infantry, national guard, the first battalion of which and the Washington guard field artillery became the 146th field artillery in the 41st division, with Colonel Edelblute in command. Arriving overseas he was assigned to command an artillery regiment in the 18th division. Since then he has served in the service of supply and in the 34th, 40th, 80th, and 82nd divisions, never having a chance to go into action. When the war closed he was on duty as instructor of heavy artillery. He returned in command of the 321st field artillery, 82nd division.

The war cost the United States \$30,177,000,000 up to June 30, 1919, according to Secretary Glass of the treasury.

The U. S. crop estimate for July 1 forecasts a record wheat yield of 1,161,000,000 bushels, a decline of 75,000,000 since June 1.

The German national assembly ratified the peace treaty July 9 by a vote of 208 to 115. However, 99 members refrained from voting.
