Local Paragraphs.

The regular bi-weekly dance at the hall is billed for tonight.

It is announced the M. E. church aid society will meet Thursday afternoon Aug. 19, at the Rest Room.

Monday's rain has materially relieved the city water situation for at least a week or two. It replenished the reservoir and soaked the ground.

Parties from here have been going to Cedar mountain near Belmont for huckleberries and returning with considerable quantities of the fruit.

The quarterly conference of the Methodist church was held yesterday evening. Dr. U. F. Hawk of Spokane, district superintendent, was in attendance.

Visitors in town this week report that very little of Monday's rain fell at Stateline and Sandpoint, in opposite directions on either side of Rathdrum.

Another call for outstanding warrants, issued Aug. 7, by Treasurer R. E. Young of Independent school district No. 2, wipes out \$1426 more of the indebtedness.

A number of Indian families passed through town Saturday riding in hacks and on horseback. They were on their return to the reservation from a trip to the mountains for huckleberries. They sold some of the fruit here at \$1.50 per gallon.

The Milwaukee had a crew here Friday of last week in charge of Fred Carlson repairing the company's water tank. The N. P. also had a crew in Rathdrum several days repairing their tank, which had been leaking badly.

Business men are urged to take a day off next Monday and join the village trustees on their excursion up Spring Branch creek. It is believed that if more of our citizens can obtain first hand knowledge of the conditions and possibilities of the source of the city water supply, a solution of the problem will be hastened.

A party of Spokane young people, sojourning with Mrs. S. H. Soss and Mrs. Mark Soss at Luger park, Twin Lakes, this week, were in Rathdrum Tuesday in their car. They spent several hours about town and seemed to be thoroughly enjoying their outing. Those in the party were J. Max Soss, Sara Soss, Louis Soss, Irving Schwartz, Sam Mackoff, Florence Ferner, Myrtle Levin and Frances Lewkawitz.

Killed in Runaway.

William McKay, age 70 years, was killed in a runaway accident while hauling water for a threshing outfit near Athol Wednesday afternoon. He was found on the road with his neck broken. While it is said there were no witnesses to the accident, it is believed the team became frightened and bolted throwing the driver to the ground.

The body was brought to O. W. Stone's undertaking rooms in Rathdrum, but is to be returned to Athol where the funeral will be held this afternoon at 3 o'clock.

McKay, who is said to have been a janitor in Spokane, moved to Athol about three weeks ago. His widow and three small children survive him.

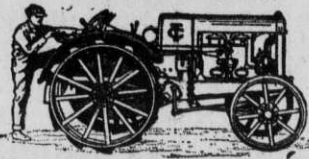
