But One Flag to be Recognized in the State of Idaho.—Susan B. Anthony Suffrage Amendment Indorsed by the Senate.

Boise.—The Idaho state senate on January 22 passed by unanimous vote the Robertson bill, which makes it a felony to display the red flag in this state. The act is almed directly at the Boisheviki and will block any attempt by agitators to create unrest in Idaho by agitators to create unrest in Idaho against the government. Speaking in support of the measure, Senator Rob-ertson said that there was but one flag to be recognized in the state of Idaho and anyone who could not salute the Stars and Stripes could leave the state and the country.

Indorsement of the Susan B. An-

thony suffrage amendment was given on January 22 by the state senate by unanimous vote in a memorial to the present congress asking that it be passed by that body. Approval will also be given to the measure by the house it is declared. The house has already passed a memorial to those senators not now supporting the amendment requesting them to do so.

the 22nd. The senate passed the
Jerome county division bill by a vote of 28 to 12. It creates a new county out of Minidoka, Gooding and Lincoln counties, with Jerome as the county seat. The house laid its measure creating the county of Clark on the table, having received a similar bill which had passed the senate. The Caribou county division bill seeking to greate a county division bill, seeking to create a new county out of the western portion of Bannock county, reached the third of Bannock county, reached the third reading in the house, but was thrown into the committee of the whole for amendment. The Twin Falls delega-tion attempted to block the introduc-tion of the proposed Buhl county divi-sion bill by moving that the house only consider such county division measures as the members from consider self-cetal as the members from counties affected introduce. The house defeated the mo-tion. The Buhl county measure has twice been before the legislature.

Following a second heated debate in committee of the whole, the senate recommittee of the whole, the senate re-commended for passage the Witty anti-rambling bill, which provides for the vy of an assessment against all prop-erty used for gambling. IDAHOANS DECLARE IDAHO WOULD PAY AGAINST RED FLAG HONOR TO TROOPS

MEASURE ADOPTED BY SENATE PLAN IS TO APPROPRIATE \$50,000 FOR CONSTRUCTION OF A COUNTY MEMORIAL.

Should the Plan be Adopted by the Legislature it Will Do Away With Any Special State Memorial Structure.

Boise.—An appropriation of \$50,000 from the state's fund to be apportioned at the rate of \$1000 for each county in Idaho that will raise a like amount for the for the construction of a county orial to soldiers that fought and died in the war against Germany, is pro-posed in a bill introduced on January 23 into the lower house of the legis-

lature.

If this plan carries, it will do away with any special state mem structure.

LEGISLATIVE NOTES

Building of a new dairy barn to cost \$5000 and of a home for trustles estimated to cost about \$7000 are two long-needed improvements to be made at the Idaho state penitentiary which Warden W. L. Cuddy, the new incumbent, will immediately commence construction of should the legislature grant his requests for ap-propriations in the amounts stated.

Reorganization of the Idaho national guard will be left entirely to the gov-ernor if the legislature adopts house bill No. 36, introduced by Charles Johnson, Kootenai.

A measure has appeared in the sen ate amending the workmen's compen-sation act to make its provisions inap-plicable to public school teachers and office and clerical employes.

Senate bill No. 16, by W. H. Witty of Bannock, makes possible the clos-ing for an indefinite period of build-ings in which gambling is permitted.

Sponsored by the mines and mining committee, a bill has been introduced in the house to create a state bureau of mines and geology which would conduct investigations of mineral resources of the state in co-operation with the United States geological survey and the United States bureau of mines.

House bill 31, by Weeks creating lien on personal property in favor of any blacksmith, horseshoer, wagon maker, garage owner, auto repairman, mechanic or motorcycle repairman was killed by the committee's recommendation that it be not printed.

Americanization of non-Englishspeaking allens is made the subject
of a measure introduced by Senator
John McMurray of Cassia county. If
the bill is passed, all persons over 16
years of age who have not attained a
iffth grade standard in the handling
of English will be compelled to attend night classes for at least 100
hours each school year until they are hours each school year until they are adjudged sufficiently proficient by their instructor.

Machinery is provided in a bill by Senator Whitcomb for the granting of a court decree withdrawing from the corporate limits of any municipality tracts of land larger than five acres which are used exclusively for agricultural purposes.

An enabling act which will remove battles over all county division ques-tions from the halls of the legislature to the polls of the counties affected by the proposed changes is said to be in preparation for early introduction in the legislature.

Senate bill No. 10, by Seaver, provides that municipalities may issue coupon bonds on 12 per cent of their assessed valuation instead of on the 6 per cent now permitted by statute.

The educational committee has offered a bill providing that when county treasurers receive federal funds arising from national forest proceed: immediate apportionments of the money must be made on the basis of 75
