CONNALLY F. TRIGG DEAD

Succumbs to Attack of Pneumonia at Home in Abingdon.

Hon. Connelly F. Trigg died of pneumonia at his home at Abingdon, Va., at 3:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon.

Mr. Trigg was born at Abingdon September 18th, 1847. He studied law and was admitted to the bar when a young man. He was successful as a lawyer, and in 1872 was honored by the people of his home county, that of Washington, by being elected to the position of Commonwealth's Attorney. This position he held twelve years, resigning in 1884.

His resignation was due to the fact that he was nominated by Democrats of the Ninth District of Virginia for the position of Representative in the lower House of Congress. Mr. Trigg was elected to the Forty-Ninth Congress and served one term, from 1884 to 1896. His Republican opponent in that race was Hon. David F. Bailey, of Bristol. Mr. Trigg received 13,844 votes, and Mr. Bailey 12,650.

Following his retirement from Congress, Mr. Trigg resumed the practice of law, and was afterwards counsel of many important cases, having been associated with Hon. Daniel Trigg on the side of the defense in the noted Baker murder case in the summer of 1891.

He is survived by his wife, who was Miss Robertson, daughter of Hon. Wyndham Robertson.—Bristol News, April 25.

MISSING MAN RETURNS HOME.

Stonewall, Va., April 25.—The general excitement caused by the mysterious disappearance of J. L. Blair, the merchant from Preacher, Va., two miles south of this place, was relieved last evening by his arrival home from Tip Top, where he had been hastily called on business.

It was feared that he had been foully dealt with, as he had a large amount of money upon his person.

The excitement was relieved by the message from Tip Top, stating Mr. Blair would arrive home last night.

A number of men were called off the works today to assist in the search for Mr. Blair, and more were to be called off tomorrow.—Bristol Herald Courier.

COLD SNAP KILLS THE PEACH CROP.

"The cold snaps of April played havoc with the fruit crops in the south," said C. H. Benly, Jr., a traveling man who has just returned from a trip through that section, to a Herald Courier reporter yesterday.

"I paid particular attention to the conditions in northern Georgia, the famous peach country," continued Mr. Benly, "and the biggest growers estimate that at least 75 per cent of the crop has been killed. The loss in that section alone, it is believed, will aggregate many thousands of dollars."

Farmers in this immediate section report that a large part of the apple crop has been destroyed, and nearly all the early fruit. There will be few if any peaches in this section due to the cold snaps.—Bristol Herald Courier.

We have decided to sell electric current by meter only, believing this to be the only equitable mode of arriving at the amount to be charged. Under a flat rate system some are charged too much and some too little. Each should pay only for the electricity used by him. We beg to announce the following rules, regulations and prices, which will hereafter govern us: The rate for lighting current will be 12 cents per thousand watts as per meter. If paid within ten days from date of bill the following discounts will be allowed: When gross bill is under \$2.50 five per cent discount will be allowed. When gross bill is over \$2.50 and under \$5.00 ten per cent discount will be allowed. When gross bill is over \$5.00 and under \$10.00 fifteen per cent discount will be allowed. When gross bill is over \$10.00 and under \$15.00 twenty per cent discount will be allowed. When the bill is over \$15.00 thirty per cent will be allowed. If bill is not paid within ten days from the date thereof, the discounts mentioned above will not be allowed, and failure to receive bill will in no case entitle a customer to a discount. Minimum bill when the meter is the property of the Company, \$1.50; when customer owns the meter, \$1.00. While we prefer the meter manufactured by the General Electric Company the consumer may, by depositing one-half the cost of meter, designate any standard make.
