VOLCANO AT CLINTWOOD, VA.

Smoke Issues From Hole in Ground Near Mysterious Mine.

Clintwood, Va., Nov. 17.—Joseph Baker arrived in Clintwood at 8 o'clock Saturday morning and reported a volcanic eruption on Prof. N. W. Remine's farm half a mile east of this city.

The report passed from person to person and hundreds of people began to flock to the designated point to investigate. The sheriff, circuit court clerk, the preachers, the small boys, were all there, and much excitement prevailed.

A hole in the ground ten feet in diameter was found and a volume of smoke issuing therefrom, seemingly that of coal burning in the hill below, where there is a coal bank which has not been operated for years.

Some attribute the smoke to the presence of natural gas, though at present no one is able to give any practicable explanation.

The coal mine near the scene of the excitement was abandoned on account of ghost stories told about it—many persons claiming to have seen sights and heard unexplainable noise during the time they were taking coal from this mine.

NEW POSTAGE STAMP.

Postmaster General Hitchcock has approved the issuance of a twelve-cent postage stamp. With the increase of the registry fee to ten cents, such a stamp is needed to cover the registration and a single rate of letter postage. The new stamp will bear the profile portrait of Gen. George Washington, from London's celebrated bust. The background and border design are the same as on the remaining stamps of the new series, the head appearing within an eclipse on end, with laurel leaves on either side. The color of the stamp has not yet been definitely decided upon. This stamp will supersede the 13-cent stamp now in use.

CLINTWOOD PAPER TO CHANGE TOWNS.

Freeling, Va., Nov. 20.—The Clintwood (Va.) News will be moved to Regina, Ky., in the near future, its editor, John W. Kerr, having decided to locate there. This paper has been the erstwhile local organ of the democratic party in Dickenson county, but in Kentucky it is announced, it will be a "hog-back advocate," which term is applied to the "citizens' organization," made up regardless of political affiliations. This unique name is said to have originated thus: In the not very remote past, a ticket, (whether state, county or municipal, is not known), was made up of both political parties, the first name on the ticket having been Hogg, the last, Baecque. During the campaign the Courier Journal was wont to refer to that ticket as "the Hogg-Baecque ticket." Soon the simplified spelling advocates were spelling it "HOG-BACK," and the name became popular.
