Ten per cent. of all the profits from the exhibition of "The Skywayman," Lt. Ormer Locklear's last picture, a William Fox production which is to be shown at the Amuzu Theater Monday, January 24th, is to be given to the families of Locklear and his pilot, Lt. Milton Elliot, by Fox Film Corporation.

A crusader for science, Lt. Locklear has appealed to the imagination as no other airman has done. He will live in history as the first flyer to go from one airplane to another in mid-air—a feat which first thrilled the world and then opened the eyes of scientists and experts to the new possibilities of aircraft. So highly were his experiments appreciated that the United States army gave him the free use of its flying fields.

"The Skywayman" is more than a thrilling picture. It contains a record of all that Locklear has done. It will show future generations what manner of man was this young American air explorer who taught the world so much. In the story Locklear plays the part of a member of the Lafayette Escadrille who loses his memory as a result of a crash in France, and then, on his return to America, fails to recognize his old friends. His plight leads him into a series of adventures which call forth all his aeronautic skill.

A race with an express train, a collision with a church steeple and a dozen other daring exploits are brought out with startling realism. The photography is said to be excellent. There are some "close ups" of Locklear taken thousands of feet above the earth.—adv.

Whitesburg, Ky., Jan. 13.—Enoch Wright, wanted in Wise county, Va., for the murder of a man named Bentley several days ago, and who was first arrested and escaped from officers, is reported to be in hiding in the mountains of the headwaters of Beaver Creek, north of here. Officers are arranging to go there to arrest Wright.

Edmund Bolling, a young man of the Kentucky-Virginia border, a few miles from here, held in jail for the assassination of Sampson Short, a poor cripple, is said to have escaped from the Wise jail and is hiding in the Cumberland Mountains along the state border. Virginia officers are searching for the escaped prisoner. He was to have gone on trial at Wise this week.

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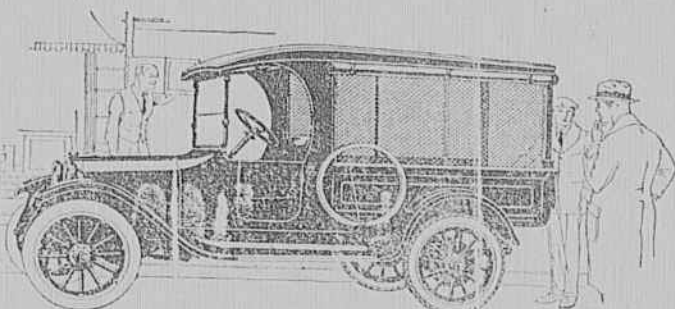
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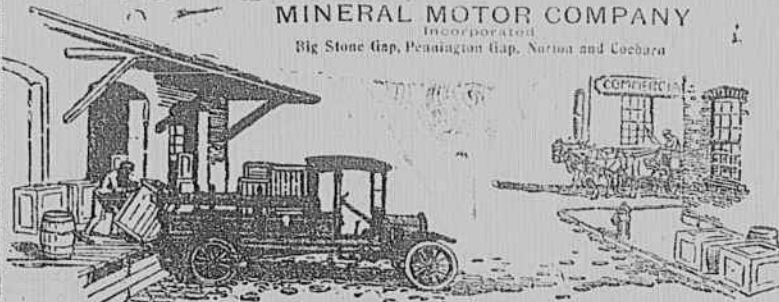
