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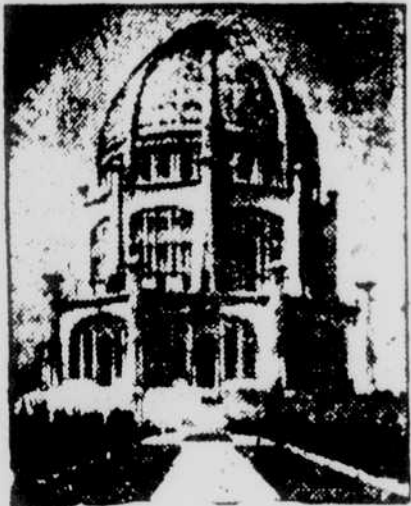

'No TB' County Drive Aim

Christmas Seal Program Starts Monday.

Eradication of tuberculosis in Champaign County is one of the goals of the 1960 Champaign County TB Association Christmas Seal fund raising drive which will begin Monday, J. E. Atkinson, president of the county group, said Saturday.

The drive to eliminate TB from the nation began a year ago.

"By a chest X-ray for every person 15 years of age and older we can reach the goal of 'No TB in Champaign County,'" Dr. A. T. Cole, superintendent of Outlook Tuberculosis Sanatorium, 1003 N. Cunningham Ave., has said.

And a new plan to reach this goal has already been inaugurated, he said, referring to the recent person-to-person chest X-ray campaign conducted in Ludlow Township.

Atkinson reminded people the Chest Clinic at 505 S. 5th St., financed with Christmas Seal contributions, is open every day of the year.

Clinic hours are 1 to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday; 7 to 9 p.m. Tuesday and 9 to 11 a.m. Saturdays.

He requested contributors through the Christmas seal campaign to be generous. Persons who do not receive seals may call the TB association headquarters at 110 1/2 N. Neil St.
