Another important feature will be the high ceiling being more than Ruth and Beulah Borne for the past thirty feet in height and there will also be a balcony. The stage which is also a very important feature in this building, will have an opening of thirty feet making the stage 30x62 feet, being the same as that in the Dauphine Theatre in the City.
