WILL NOT AFFECT DRAINAGE STATION

The drain station at Ptolemy street and Whitney avenue will not be put out of commission as a result of the operation of pumps at Bayou Barataria.

The main plant of the Jefferson-Plaquemines drainage district, will have good effect in keeping the water off the rear section of Algiers, but the drain station built and operated by the city through the Sewerage and Water Board has not nor will it outlive its usefulness as a result of the completion of the new plant.

George S. Earl, general superintendent of the Sewerage and Water Board, said Tuesday the station has a big permanent duty to perform.

The outfall canal, Mr. Earl said, serves as one of the main arteries for the station of the Jefferson-Plaquemines Drainage District. It is through this outlet that Station No. 8 of the Sewerage and Water Board discharges excessive rainfall. The station in question drains practically all of the improved section of Algiers and is known as the intermediate lift. Mr. Earl said that lift was essential in perfecting the drainage of Algiers and is just as important now that the new station is completed as Station No. 1, at Broad and Melpomene streets, which serves as the intermediate lift to one-third the area of New Orleans improved by the installation of the drainage system by the Sewerage and Water Board.

The Algiers station, which does not take care of so great an area as the section in the city mentioned, has a capacity of 150 cubic feet per second, or 67,500 gallons of water per minute. That is about half the capacity of the pump now in operation at the Barataria station.

NAVAL STATION NOTES

It is understood that the home yard of the U. S. S. Severn has been changed from Boston to New Orleans. This is the first vessel assigned to New Orleans and it is expected that she will arrive sometime in April for repairs.

The Parisian, for which George W. Buell is agent, is expected to dock for minor repairs about March 1.

With the exception of the Turrialba, the United Fruit fleet has finished their present dockings at the Station. The Turrialba will dock about March 19th for painting and repairs to her tall shaft.

All the Navy quarters at the Station are now occupied, three by Naval and two by Marine officers. With these, the Barracks and dispensary all going, the pasture of the past three years has come back to its own.

Bids for the alterations to buildings Nos. 10 and 11 will be opened at Washington on the 27th. The work called for in these bids will change the storehouses into up-to-date Barracks for the Marines, who will be ordered here as soon as the work is completed.

Proposals are out for the building of quarters for the housing of the radio operators. The present conditions were never equal to taking care of the men necessary for the operation of even the small outfit now in use and with the new machine going, the present force will have to be three times as large.

SILENT HELPERS CIRCLE.

The annual meeting of the Silent Helper's Circle, King's Daughters, was held Thursday, February 18, at the home of the leader, Miss S. E. Pearson, and was well attended. Among those present was Mrs. H. L. Hoyt of Bremerton, Wash., who, after an absence of four years, has returned to New Orleans to reside permanently. Miss Pearson, in a few well chosen words, gave Mrs. Hoyt a hearty welcome, and expressed her own and the Circle's pleasure at the happy reunion.

After the reading of the minutes, the secretary's report was read and proved a surprise to all, as the amount of work accomplished far exceeded all expectations. There had been a larger attendance at meetings, and a keener interest has been manifested in the work of the Circle. The membership has been increased to 35, ten new names having been added to the roll, while only four resignations were recorded, two on account of removal from the city.

Koppel, first vice-leader; Mrs. Cora Johnson, second vice-leader; Miss G. Herbert, secretary; Miss Alice O'Conner, treasurer.

Two more names were added to the membership, Mrs. H. L. Hoyt and Mrs. Louis Lorio.

Refreshments were served, after which the meeting adjourned to the second Thursday in March.
