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LET'S SEND GOV. SANDERS

We will be called upon shortly to elect a member of the 1915 Constitutional Convention from Washington Parish. We cast no reflection upon other prominent and able citizens of this parish when we say that we hope that Ex-Gov. J. Y. Sanders will be the member from Washington. There is not in the community a man better qualified to represent the parish than J. Y. Sanders. More than a representative of the parish he is representative of the entire state and his power and influence will be a dominating factor in the convention.

If Gov. Sanders runs for the convention he will most assuredly be elected. We do not know what his desires are in the matter. But in a case like this the welfare of the community must be the prime essential. And in this case the best interest, not only of our parish, but of the State of Louisiana demand that J. Y. Sanders should be a member of the Constitutional Convention. His active public career and the numerous offices which he has held in the past, combined with his vast experience in legislative affairs of the State, would give him a standing in the Convention which no other representative from this or any other parish could hope to enjoy. And the commanding position which he held in the recent struggle at Baton Rouge on behalf of the plain people has rendered it imperative that he should continue to lead in the fight for the rights of the masses.

As we have stated the Enterprise does not know whether Gov. Sanders wants to go to the convention or not, but knowing the man we would say that if he had any such desires he would have said so long since. But whether he wants to go or not we, the people of this parish need him there. We believe that the best interest of this parish and state demand that Gov. Sanders should be a member of the convention and we sincerely hope that he can be prevailed upon to accept the nomination.

POLITICAL STRAWS

In last Sunday's Times-Picayune it was stated that Judge Brunot and Senator Beale of Baton Rouge had announced as candidates for the Constitutional Convention from East Baton Rouge Parish and that they were Administration candidates. Opposed to them the T P stated that G. K. Favrot and W. H. Bynum had become candidates backed by the "ring or old Sanders element."

In the same issue on another page appeared notices from Senator Beale and Judge Brunot that they had withdrawn from the race!

Senator Beale stated that his health was such that his physician would not permit him to run and Judge Brunot, while admitting that his health was good, seemed to think that the running was poor.

Mr. Bynum announced as an anti-Hall man stating that he was opposed to Gov. Hall and to any and all schemes to increase the taxes of the people. It is stated that this announcement, and the enthusiasm it provoked among the people, was the direct cause that lead up to the sudden impairment of the health of Senator Beale, and to the public announcement that neither he nor his running mate, Judge Brunot would or could any longer stay in the race.

Hall and Higher Taxes can not win in this fight, for thanks to the fight made by Gov. Sanders and his friends at Baton Rouge the Administration idea, as contained in the Sundberry Bill, that "the saw mill labor" i. e. common people should have no voice in this matter, was defeated and as the bill now stands the common people will not only elect their representatives themselves but will also have the right to vote for or against the Constitution itself when written.

Scarcely a day passes that the business and professional men of Bogalusa are not called upon to assist people who are begging. Investigation proves that nine out of every ten are non residents of the Parish.
