of Orleans to reach the $\$ 2000$ mark, the nearest to her being Caddo with 1666.72

The first apportionment of public school funds under the recent enumer-
ation of educable children in the State was announced by Superintendent of Education Aswell a few days ago, and gives the total number of 491,801 , which is an increase
36,000 over the number according which previous appropriations hav been made.
The total amount of money to distributed at this time is $\$ 54,648.1$ giving a per capita of 11 cents to each child. Apportionments will be made according to the present enum-
