One open type nozzle true Diesel, crude oil engine, direct connected alternator unit, having a rating of 350 true K. W. at 80 per cent P. F. (437 K. V. A.) 2300 volt 3 phase 60 cycle, to have belted exciter and triplex cooling water pump.

Switch board panel, two circuit feeder panel, all with necessary instruments and voltage regulator.

One induction motor generator set, rated 35 K. W. at 125 volts on D. C. end, with 2200 voltage motor complete.

Two single stage bronze fitted split casing centrifugal pump, each mounted on a common base plate, and direct connected to a 2200 volt Cage type induction motor, each pump to be designed for 1300 g. p. m. against a total head of 150 feet.
