NEW AGRICULTURAL BUILDING ERECTED

The most important improvement at the Louisiana State Fair grounds this year is the erection of a mam moth new agricultural building known as the Louis N. Brueggerho? Memorial Hall, in honor of the late Mr. Brueggerhoff, for several years secretary of the State Fair.

This building, which will meet a long felt want due to the rapid growth of the agricultural exhibits, represents an expenditure of approximately \$75,000. It is constructed of brick with terra cotta trimmings and classic in style, and is the largest struc ture on the grounds. It is 250 feet long and 130 wide, with center aisle 45 feet in width. At each end there is a wide triple entrance, and three single entrances at each side. There is ample space for all of the parish fair booths, the Junior Extension ex hibits, State University exhibits and all other agricultural displays.

A combination lecture and moving picture booth, or room 30x60 feet has been provided especially for use by the Junior Extension Department of the University, and there are office for the officials and assistants in charge, and a rest room for the lady attendants.

In erecting this mammoth building this year, the Fair Association had in mind not only the importance of encouraging agricultural progress at all times, but of giving special en couragement while the nation is at war and the need for food production is record-breaking.
