School Board Proceedings.

PROCLAMATION OF ELECTION.

Pursuant to an ordinance of the Washington Parish School Board adopted at a meeting of the said School Board held on Tuesday, the 9th. day of September 1919, I, F. B. Bateman, President of the said School Board, hereby give notice that, in conformity with said ordinance, a special election will be held in the Bogalusa School District on the 21st. day of October 1919, for the purpose of submitting to the property taxpayers qualified under the Constitution and laws of Louisiana to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

PROPOSITION.

To incur debt and issue bonds to the amount of Three Hundred Thousand Dollars, (\$300,000.00), to run twenty-five years from their date, and to bear interest at the rate of five per centum (5 per cent) per annum, payable semi-annually, the proceeds from the sale of said bonds at not less than par to be used for the purpose of purchasing, constructing and equipping public school buildings within the Bogalusa School District.

For the purpose of holding said election the polling will be as follows:—Precincts Number One, Two, Three and Four all within the Bogalusa School District and the City of Bogalusa.

At said election the polls will open at seven (7) o'clock A. M. and close at five (5) o'clock P. M. according to law.

Notice is also hereby given that at 11 o'clock A. M. on Wednesday, the 22nd day of October, 1919, the Washington Parish School Board will meet at Franklinton, Louisiana, at the Court House, and in open session proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count ballots in number and amount, examine and canvass the returns and declare the results of said special election.

GOVERNMENT WILL MAKE DISPLAY OF TROPHIES OF WAR

Uncle Sam Arranges to Put On Victory Show at the Louisiana State Fair.

One of the most popular attractions at the Victory State Fair of Louisiana October 22 to 27, inclusive, will be a gigantic exhibit by the United States Government, which will send several carloads of interesting specimens from its various departments, including the Army and Navy, to Shreveport for Fair Week. The federal government encourages agricultural fairs, such as the State Fair of Louisiana, and in sending the mammoth government display to Shreveport it will give splendid evidence of this co-operative policy.

The big exhibit, for which 9,000 square feet of space has been reserved, will be shown in the old Agricultural Building, which is conveniently located, about half-way between the Exposition Building and the new Agricultural Hall. In the same building the automobile folks will have their booths, which will add to the popularity of the building housing the government exhibits.

Hon. F. Lamson Scribner, chairman, Joint Committee on Government Exhibits, will be in general charge of the government's display, which will represent all branches of Uncle Sam's service, including agriculture, army, navy, mine rescue work, social welfare work and all other features of the government's activities.

The combined exhibits furnished by the government will constitute a victory show in themselves. They will display many of the tools used by the Army and Navy in the war, as well as demonstrating the better methods of farming by which American farmers produced the enormous crops that weighed powerfully against the Germans. Other phases of government work will also be dealt with interestingly. Many war trophies, including some captured from the Huns on the battlefields of France, will be among the intensely interesting relics shown.

STATE FAIR RACE MEET WILL BRING OUT A BIG FIELD

Three Days of Horse Racing On the Victory State Fair Program at Shreveport.

Three days of horse racing, both harness and running events, are on the program of the 1919 State Fair of Louisiana, to be held at Shreveport, October 22 to 27, inclusive. The race meet will take place the first three days of the Fair, the Victory Exposition, with purses offered to the amount of \$3,600.

George R. King of Indianapolis, Ind., who stands at the top of the race meet officials of the country, will serve as superintendent. He is considered one of the fairest men in the game, and under his direction everybody connected with the races, including spectators, is promised most excellent treatment.

Horses from many parts of the country will be at the Victory Fair, and each contest promises to be hotly fought. Some of the best known jockeys and drivers will be on hand, as the track at Shreveport is looked upon as one of the fastest mile circuits in the South, and the accommodations and facilities for races are such as will make the meet successful.

MANY SWINE EXHIBITS PROMISED STATE FAIR

With general competition open to the world and very liberal prizes offered those showing the finest exhibits, the annual Swine Show at the State Fair of Louisiana, October 22 to 27, inclusive, promises to be featured by the liveliest interest since it was begun fourteen years ago. Some of the most noted herds in the United States will be represented among the exhibits, due to the attractive premiums offered, the splendid facilities provided and the increasing interest that is being taken in the swine industry in Louisiana and adjoining States.

During the past several years the raising of fine hogs has commanded the attention of many farmers and livestock breeders in Louisiana, with the lessons taught at the State Fair playing an important part in this development. Many razorbacks have been eliminated and their places taken by registered stock. The value of fine blood has become recognized by many citizens, and much of this recognition can be traced to the State Fair, where the exhibition of fine animals stimulated interest in the industry. Among the exhibits this year there will be a splendid lot of Louisiana bred hogs, and the visitors will be given a good idea of the possibilities offered along this line. As usual, the opportunity of purchasing registered stock to improve present herds and begin new ones will also be given.

Several thousand dollars will be awarded in premiums at the Swine Show. The judging will be conducted by Prof. Herbert M. Mumford of the University of Illinois. Prof. E. L. Jordan of the Louisiana State University, will be the superintendent.

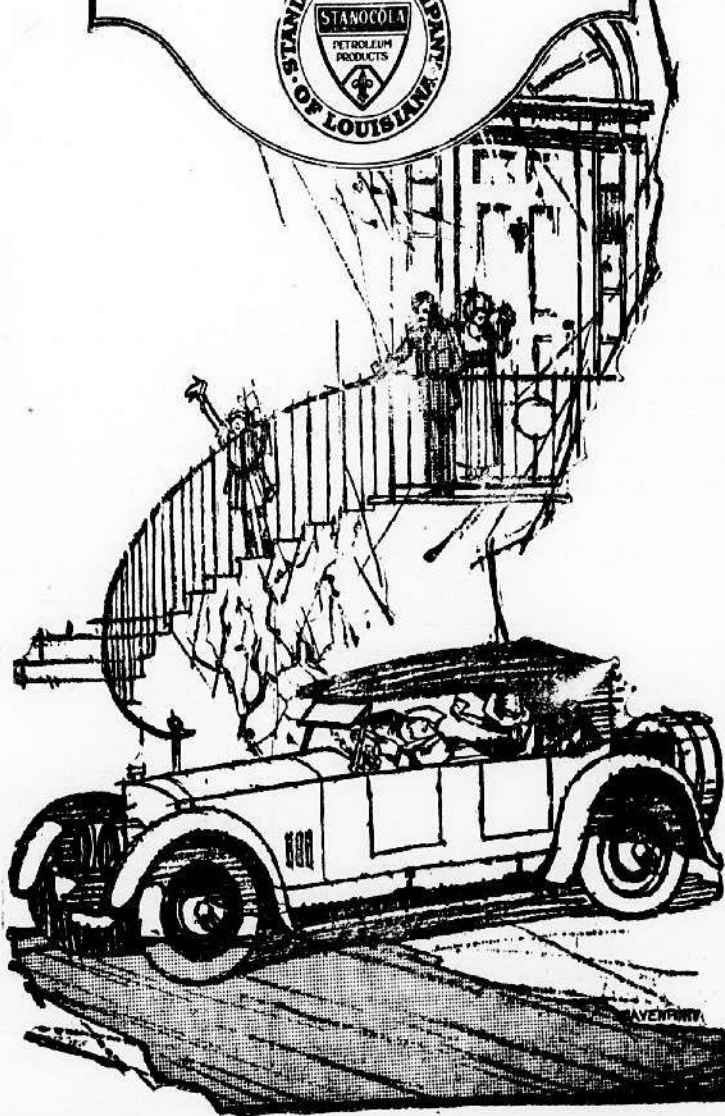
