"I do not feel that there is quite as much doubt as usual about the Louisiana field. This field, to my mind, offers larger inducements for investment and greater promise for the future than does that of Beaumont, by long odds. The surface indications are fully as good, the geological formation is better, and the oil so far discovered is of superior quality. 
