#### Big Consolidation of Oil Interests.

Says the Lake Charles Daily American:

"The Lucas Oil and Tank Car Co., of Beaumont, is the name of a corporation which has just been organized under the laws of Texas, and has completed one of the largest deals in oil lands that has ever gone out of Beaumont," said Dr. E. Y. Ames, late manager of the Texas and Louisiana National oil well here, and at present president of the new company, to an American representative at the Howard hotel this morning.

Dr. Ames returned last night from Beaumont, where the deal was closed yesterday, and left again this morning on the eleven o'clock Southern Pacific railroad for New Orleans, from which place he will go in a few days to New York and thence to England.

In speaking further of the deal, Dr. Ames said: "The holdings of the company comprise twenty guahers, on Spindle Top, each a 6-inch well, 1,100 acres of land at Sour Lake, in Jefferson county, 700 acres adjacent to the sulphur mines, of the Union Sulphur company, in Calcasieu parish, La., the entire island of Cote Blanche, which is one of the islands near Morgan City and adjacent to the Avery salt island. The government report shows salt on all of these islands."

Ah, but we see in Mr. Payne's words the kind of consent which led to the enactment of the law. It was the striking of hands by selfish interests; it was a mutual agreement to divide the spoils. That is why it is a "dangerous precedent" to take away any one's part of the plunder. The danger would be that the whole of the booty would have to be given up. This is protection doing its perfect work; this is its nature fully revealed. But in this very effrontery of tariff beneficiaries, in the very steps they are taking to make protection absurd and hateful, we see the promise of a speedy reaction, which will compel the monopolists to loosen their grasp, and inflict one more deadly wound upon a fiscal system which is embodied selfishness, the height of unreason, and never more clearly than now a national folly.—N. Y. Evening Post.
