This ball will be the closing scene of one of the most magnificent carnivals that has ever been witnessed in the State. There will be two days of festivities, fun, mirth and music.

On Monday morning, the 13th, there will be witnessed the arrival of the Grand Pa Di Shah (King) of the Carnival. He will be escorted to the courthouse, where the keys of the city will be turned over to him. He and his Pa Di Shina will then review the grand Trades' Union and Business Display and Parade. On that night the Princess of the Orient and Hoo Hoo's will parade. Tuesday morning the Commercial Travelers and other orders will parade, and that night will be the grand Mardi Gras procession, followed by the ball.

The Grand Order of the Orient at Shreveport has captured both the city and surrounding cities and country by their efforts in this matter, and there will be a whole town full of people on the occasion.

All the railroads will give one fare rates into Shreveport on account of this great occasion.

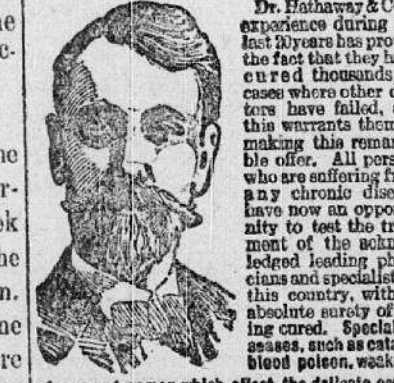
