SHORT WEIGHTS.

WHAT TO EAT has printed articles showing how buyers of fruit are swindled by weighted baskets. Purchasers have often noticed how strawberry boxes were made with the bottom reaching near a quarter of the top. There is a great demand among retailers for heavy bard legal battle. wrapping paper and paper bags, and the foods bought by the consumer are usually weighed in the paper. Bottles are made with bottoms protruding an inch or more into the interior, that the dealer may cheat the purchaser out of an smount of the purchased liquid which may be displaced by the protruding bottom. Very few beer bottles or other containers now on the market hold as much as they are represented to hold. Most of the bread on the market is short-weighted, and measures of many kinds, as the scales are devised with the one purpose of defrauding the consumer. People should watch out for these frauds, and protest against them, not so much because of the amount they lose by them, but because the principle is bad. It is nothing short of stealing, and it ought to be the duty of every American citizen to do his part in freeing the country of graft of this kind as well as of every other kind. It is this petty thievery on the part of America's businessmen that is reflected in the political graft and even in the burglaries and high- average American will regard a way robberies which so sorely menace our country. How can we expect the poor man to be honest when he sees stealing all around him among men who are respected às honorable citizens?

France's Low Birth Rate.

N. O. States

The French authorities, unlike President Roosevelt, do not write congratulatory letters or send autograph portraits to parents who have fifteen or twenty children in order to encourage the production of large families. Recently M. Maurice Barris was appointed to distribute for the French Academy, the "prix de vertu" presented 300 francs each to the parents of a peasant family of nineteen and of twenty-one children. "Such mo-thers," declared M. Barris, in commenting on his mission, "are saints and beroiues."

But it is safe to say that the premium of only three dollars per child as rather poor encouragement to raise the birth rate of France, which at the present time Saturday February 8th 1908, is alarmingly low. All things considered it would appear that the French government could well afford to adopt the suggestion of the French Academy and offer a far more substantial reward to the heads of large families. While official recognition, however, unsubstantial it may be, is highly regarded by the common people of France, if the government were to offer a reward for large families and give a sum of money sufficient to assist materially in their maintenance there is no reason to doubt that much better results in the matter of increasing the birthrate would be obtained.

It seems to be agreed on the part of the French authorities that something will have to be done to e of the people to the great danger of race suicide. The statistics of 1906, we are told. show for France the lowest birth rate in her history, as the plurality of births over deaths was only 26,000 in a nation numbering 40. 000,000 people. It is very evident that under this condition it would be impossible for France to recover from the loss of a great war and her decline would be inevita-


