School Board Proceedings.

St. Martinville, La., Dec. 4th, 1919.

At a meeting of the St. Martin Parish School Board held this day the following members were present: Hon. L. V. Labbe, President; Messrs. Fournet, Gonsoulin, Martin, Delord, St. Germain. Absent: Mr. Angelle.

The minutes of the previous meeting were approved as read.

Upon motion of Mr. Martin, seconded by Mr. Champagne and carried, the walk leading to the Atchafalaya School repaired.

The petition of the patrons of the Magenta School was received and action deferred.

Upon motion of Mr. Martin, seconded by Mr. St. Germain and carried, the schools were ordered to close for the Christmas Holidays on Friday, Dec. 19 and to re-open on Monday January 5th.

Upon motion of Mr. Germain, seconded by Mr. Champagne and carried, the Superintendent was authorized to rent the 42.4 acres of land belonging to the School Board in Sec. 16, T 9, S R 6 E for the year 1920 on shares, 1/3 of the crop to be the Board's portion if cane, corn or cotton is planted and 1-5 should rice be planted.

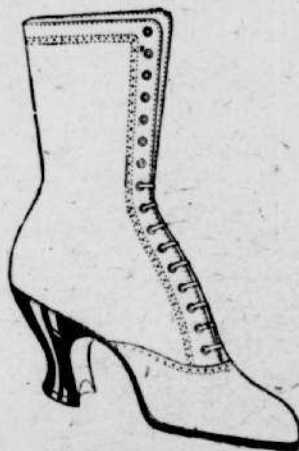

Proclamation of Election.

Pursuant to an ordinance of the Mayor and Town Council adopted at a meeting held on the 4th day of December 1919, I, Albert Bienvenu, Mayor of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, hereby give notice that, in conformity with said ordinance, a special election will be held in the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, on Tuesday the 13th day of January 1920, for the purpose of submitting to the property tax payers qualified under the Constitution and Laws of the State of Louisiana, to vote at said election, the following proposition, to-wit:

Proposition No. 1. To incur debt on behalf of and in the name of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, and issue bonds to the amount of Fifteen Thousand (\$15,000.00) Dollars, to run Twenty (20) years from their date, and to bear interest at the rate of five (5) per cent per annum, payable semi-annually, the proceeds from the sale of said bonds at not less than par, to be used for the purpose of constructing and equipping joint systems of waterworks and electric light plant.

For the purpose of holding said election the polling places will be as follows: At the Town Hall, St. Martinville, Louisiana. At said election the polls will open at seven (7:00) o'clock a. m., and close at five (5:00) o'clock p. m., according to law.

Notice is also hereby given that at 2 o'clock, p. m., on Wednesday the fourteenth day of January 1920 the Mayor and Town Council of the Town of St. Martinville, Louisiana, will meet at the Town Hall at St. Martinville, Louisiana, and in open session, proceed to open the ballot boxes, examine and count the ballots in number and amount examine and canvass the returns and declare the result of said special election.
