We are informed that Wayne Barton was killed, and Edward Burleson, Jr., badly wounded in a rencounter in Washington county, a short time since. Burleson and a cousin of his bearing the same name were engaged on one side, and Barton on the other. As the story goes, several shots were fired, two of which took effect on E. Burleson, and one or more on Barton, when the Burlesons rushed in, beat down Barton with their guns, and left him for dead, though he afterwards regained his horse, rode home, and lived ing struck with the cock of a gun, through which the brain worked out, causing his death. SPLENDID COLD WATER TEMPLE.-The sons of Temperance of Bahimore, have nearly completed their magnificent edifice on North Gay street, which has been in the course of erection for the last year. Omitting the description of the very beautiful arrangements in the interior, we extract the following from the Sun:
