An English paper opposes the retention of Transvaal by England.

On the 23d of December, the Chili-an army was within 20 miles of Lima.

Large crowds, principally of students attacked the Jews of Berlin on New Year's day.

Thirty-six persons were wounded during the Senatorial elections in Cerra, Brazil, lately.

The principal iron buoys were carried from their moorings by the ice in New York harbor.

The Union of Bolivia with Peru is to be decided by a vote of the Departmental Assemblies.

Wm. Perry, the Tipton Slasher, a noted pugilist, died from drink in London, on Christmas eve.

A sonnambulist, Sabel McLachlin, fell in a well during one of her night excursions at Halifax, N. S.

The Chesapeake has been covered with ice to that extent that vessels have been jammed therewith.

It seems probable that the Mississippi river appropriation will go through in the improvement bill.

On the 24th of December General Skobeleff's army was defeated near Geok Tepe, by the Tekke Turcomans.

At a dance in Saginaw county, Mich., Henry Fisher, a farm hand, was stabbed and killed by one Peter Wills.

The Catholic journals of Rome have been requested to submit their articles on Ireland to the Vatican before publication.

In pursuance with an act of Parliament, all prisoners for debt in Scotland were released at midnight on New Year's eve.

It has been found impossible to organize the New York Board of Aldermen thus far, owing to the divisions between the Democrats.

Gen. McDowell's vote, which he was given the opportunity to cast for Garfield, by being ordered to Washington, cost the country \$1,500.

The trial of the Irish traversers continues in Dublin. Parnell and others, it is rumored will not be allowed to occupy their seats in Parliament.

In accordance with an opinion of the Attorney General, President Hayes will designate in turn each Cabinet officer to act as temporary Secretary of the Navy.

So long as the balance of trade is in favor of the United States, the coinage of gold will be continued at the rate of from seven to ten millions per month.

Eight thousand Land Leaguers held a meeting near Killarney, Ireland, lately, and another of 3,000 at Killala. The troops were stoned at another near Tnam.

Miss Kate Campbell and Miss Woods were burned to death while dressing for a ball at Hamburg, Mo., on New Years eve, the fire catching in their dresses.

The Pullman Palace Car Company have been defeated in an attempt to enjoin the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company in an infringement of patent suit.

In attempting to stop a difficulty at Hockley, Texas, Mr. Thomas Ray, an old and respected citizen was foully murdered by a man named Alfred Laurence.

Gen. Mahone is reported to be about to issue an address announcing his intention to act with the Republicans, which course is considered an open bid for Federal patronage.

Congressman Morton being incapacitated from filling the place of Secretary of the Treasury by reason of being engaged in placing government bonds, continues as a prominent candidate for the Senatorship.

The cold has been so intense throughout the North, in some places reaching 28° below zero, that railway trains have been unable to move, many of the employees being frost bitten in attempting to do duty.

THE N. O. PACIFIC RAILROAD.

Thus far nothing positive has been ascertained as to the designs of the Directors of the Pacific Railway, with regard to the location of their Mississippi river crossing.

From the New Orleans papers we gather the information that the company have bought a square for depot grounds at the foot of Thalia street, next to the levee. From the same source the rumor comes that in disregard to the great interests of the projected line and the convenience of the people of this State, the Engineers are doing their utmost to have the State Capital, Baton Rouge, left out of the line of their roadway.

By the loss of thousands upon thousands of dollars annually, will the owners of the N. O. Pacific Road, note the error they will have committed, should the surmises of our contemporaries be verified. The people of the State must, sooner or later, have easy access by rail to their Capital; and the road that will have the foresight to give them that accommodation will reap the harvest that a growing city of 8,000 inhabitants furnishes, especially one which must soon bring within her limits, as Baton Rouge will, the trade of that rich section of country lying between the Jackson Railroad and the Mississippi.

We hope yet, that the narrow policy of avoiding important centres of population, for the sake simply of saving a few thousands of dollars in building the road will not prevail, neither that the managers will be controlled by individuals who are interested in selling some embankments and cuts through some of the most impassable swamps in the State.

We will not attempt to conceal our chagrin and disappointment in seeing the line constructed without any consideration for the needs and the convenience of the people residing south of the Red River.

We hope that Governor Wiltz, who feels the necessity of having the State Capital accessible by rail to the people of the State, will use every endeavor to dissuade Gen. Dodge from locating the line where it will prove so detrimental to the public good.

We also call upon Col. Robertson, particularly, and the other Representatives in Congress from this State to do their utmost in preventing the proposed transfer of lands heretofore granted the Baton Rouge, Vicksburg and Pacific Railway to a corporation that would abandon the course specified as a condition in the land grant.

President Hayes expressed himself in conversation with Gen. Garfield, as being anxious to lay down his official cares in order to retire to his home to look after his private affairs in Fremont, Ohio. General Garfield seemed to realize that he would not lie in a bed of roses when he assumed the duties of his office. He is being pressed by every section of the country with regard to the Cabinet appointments.

The Boers and Dutchmen in Cape Colony, are presenting a threatening front to the British troops, who are massing with gatling guns and other artillery to engage them in active warfare, and to efface the stain of recent defeats.

The retired army officers are much chagrined in being withdrawn from active duty and the exercise of their power.

The thermometer at Antrim, N. H., went down to 38° below zero.

There are 702 manufacturing establishments in Richmond, Va., an increase of 137 during the past year.

The war fever is pervading Greece and the people are arming for the fray. The Arbitration scheme seems to have been abandoned.

One hundred and fifty men of the 94th British regiment in attempting to charge the Boers, in the Transvaal were killed or captured in about 15 minutes.

The Republicans of Maine are preparing to steal the Governor.

At the New Year's reception, President Grevy was conveyed the good wishes of the diplomatic corps through the Papal Nuncio.

Patrick Donohue, charged with larceny in Mobile, was discharged by Recorder Owen, on the ground that a husband cannot steal from his wife.

S. B. Newman & Co., a well-known firm of cotton brokers, of New Orleans, have suspended.

A railway train on the Ashapoo River, S. C., fell through a bridge, killing three men.

Near Bancroft, Iowa, the steps of a passenger car of a passing train caught some laborers in a cut, killing six of them.

The trade for American provisions is growing in Southern Europe.

Capt. John Fitzpatrick has been elected President of the Irish Land League of New Orleans.

The socialists of Chicago have decided upon a re-organization with a view of continuing the agitation of their principles throughout the Union.

A large party of negro ex-slaves, returning from Kansas, passed through Little Rock, on their way back to Mississippi. They report great destitution and suffering in Kansas.

The Mississippi Valley and Ship Island railroad is being rapidly pushed to completion from Vicksburg on.

The Natchez people contemplate building a railroad to Alexandria, La., and another to Trinity.

The orange crop of Hancock county, Miss., is reported to have been destroyed by the cold weather.

The Laredo stage was robbed by two men, who afterwards invited the passengers to alight and warm themselves at a fire.

The German Colonists in the Volga section of Russia are reported to be in a starving condition.
