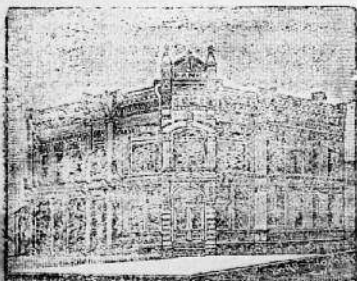

A STRONGER ORGANIZATION.

Delegates go to West Virginia and Kentucky
Next Week.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 21.—President Mitchell is arranging to send more organizers into the strike regions of West Virginia and Kentucky on Monday morning, in an effort to complete the organization of the soft coal workers there before the convention to vote on the national strike question is held. At present not more than half the men are firmly organized, and any little break in the ranks would be a loss hard for the strikers to overcome; for this reason the convention was placed four weeks hence.

Mitchell refused today to discuss the situation in Ohio, Indiana, Illinois and Iowa. He says the outlook in West Virginia is encouraging.

Mob Captures Town Hall.

Pittsburg, Pa., June 21.—Word has been received here that a mob of 5000 persons demolished the town hall at New Kensington 17 miles south of this city. The mob is threatening the lives of three laborers, one of whom fatally shot a young man at that place. The telegraph and telephone wires leading into the town have been cut.

Heavy Storm in the East.

BIG MARINE DEAL.

Heywood Brothers Purchase Five Steamboats and Twenty-Five Barges.

Heywood Bros. have lately purchased of Messrs. Caldwell & Ray the steamer "Oscar G." and the two tugs "Goldie" and "Two Brothers," together with thirteen barges. They have also purchased the tug "Bernie Holmes" and six barges of the McCain Bros. and the steamer Henrietta of Senator H. C. Drew. It is the intention to combine these craft and incorporate into one company.

The policy of the new company will be the same as that of the old. "Equal rights to all, special privileges to none."

It will be their earnest endeavor to enjoy the same kindly feeling and the same confidence of their patrons that has been enjoyed by their predecessors. To this end they have engaged the services of Captains Caldwell, Ray and McCain, who will contribute to conduct the business as before.

The same freight rates will prevail unless they find that by the consolidation they are warranted in lowering them.

REID GETS A CARRIAGE.

Objects to Taking an Inferior Place in the Procession.

Washington, June 21.—Special Envoy from the United States to the Coronation, Whitelaw Reid, is to have a carriage to himself in the royal procession through the streets of London next Friday. He objected to a Turk and a Frenchman having the place of honor, while he had been allotted a seat with his back toward the horses, according to the official program as published. He sent word to the Lord Chamberlain regretting that he would have to definitely decline to join the procession under such circumstances. The matter was referred to the king, who, the instant he heard the trouble, declared that the United States should have a separate carriage.

In Memory of Amos Cummings.

Contests for World's Championship This Week.

New York, June 21.—Followers of the pugilistic game on this side of the water are awaiting with more amusement than interest the results of the so called championship bouts to be pulled off in London during the coronation festivities. According to the program, the series of events is to be inaugurated tonight between "Spike" Sullivan of America, and Jabez White of England, for the 134-pound championship of the world. Those who are to mix it up during the coming week are "Denver Ed" Martin and "Bob" Armstrong; "Joe" Wallcott and "Tommy" West; Frank Erne and "Pat Daly"; and last and least "Tom" Sharkey and "Gus" Ruhlin, who are slated to decide the heavy weight "championship." It would be difficult to get together a more representative lot of "has-beens" than the American fighters named, while the few Britishers to appear are of no larger calibre, having taken their turns a long time ago at being walloped by second-raters from this side of the water.
