GEN. BURNSIDE VINDICATED. HAD THINGS SAID OF HIM TAKEN BACK. In the last issue of the Mound City Journal, we find the following article in reference to Gen. Burnside and his course in connection with the Cairo & Vincennes railroad. After the suspension of work on the line of the road, people began to suspect that Gen. Burnside could not or would not, build the road, and as a result of damaging stories, circulated to do him injury, both in the capacity of private citizen, and as the head of a great railroad corporation. The general has vindicated himself, however, and the people are beginning to learn that he is a man of honor as well as of ability. The following are the Journal's remarks on Gen. Burnside: During a considerable period of time after the suspension of work on the Cairo & Vincennes railroad many were disposed to suspicion the motives or doubt the competency of Gen. Burnside. Some thought he had sold out the enterprise to rival corporations, in a shape to prevent the completion of the road. Others concluded he had greatly overreached himself by endeavoring to perform what he was not completely, peculiarly and otherwise, to do, and thus had inflicted great loss if not utter ruin upon many who had reposed confidence in him. And there were circumstances that in a measure gave reason for suspicion. All are happy to know, however, that they were without foundation, and that the General has cleared from his reputation every vestige of cloud that had been cast upon it in connection with the C & V. R. His character now shines in the purity of honest intention and action. We are led to these remarks by a letter recently received from a Boston gentleman, who held a large amount of the old Ill. Southern R. R. bonds, and who thought Burnside was endeavoring to wrong him out of them, but who finally, in common with many others, has discovered his mistake, and is anxious to counteract the effect of what he has hitherto said derogatory to the business character of the General, as far as possible. We extract from the letter as follows: Boston, Feb'y 29th, 1912. DEAR SIR: Gen. Burnside has made a satisfactory settlement with me, in regard to the Ill. Southern R. R. bonds owned by me. Circumstances beyond his control have prevented his being down here. I now take back all the bad things I have said about him, and can say with truth he is a gentleman and man of honor. If you are disposed to give him a kind word in your paper it will please me. Truly Yours, J. W. MAYNARD.

OBITUARY. DEATH OF MARTIN SMYTH. MARTIN SMYTH, whose death has been announced previously in THE BULLETIN, was 48 years old, and a native of Galway, Ireland. He was a merchant, engaged in the produce or grocery business. He has a wife and eight children, one of whom, William Smyth, attending school at Cape Girardeau, is now lying on a sick bed, unable to attend the funeral ceremonies of his deceased father. Mr. Smyth came to America some four months ago, on a visit to his relations, and was expecting to return to his native country in a short time. But death intervened and instead of a glad and happy reunion with his wife and children in the land of his birth, the sad tidings of his unexpected death will fall, with terrible weight, upon their shocked hearts. During the short time Mr. Smyth sojourned in this city, he made many warm and sincere friends, to whom his sudden death is a source of unfeigned sorrow and regret. He was a member of the Catholic church, and to-morrow at twelve o'clock, Solemn Requiem Mass, with the remains present, will be said for the repose of his soul, at the Catholic church in this city. The train carrying the funeral cortege will leave the foot of Eighth street for Villa Ridge at 2 o'clock p. m. Friends of the family are invited to attend the funeral.

Here the river continues swelling and so far has raised over two feet with the prospect of several feet more water. At Pittsburg the decline in the river continues. At Cincinnati the rapid rise in the Ohio goes bravely on and also at Louisville there is eight feet in the canal and six feet in the chute. The Cumberland river is still rising with eight feet on Harpeth shoals. The condition of the Mississippi is getting very bad and the boats are having considerable trouble with the sand bars; there is about 64 feet in the channel and the river is falling. It is a deplorable fact that the Ohio and Mississippi rivers will not work conjointly with each other, when one is rising the other will be falling. The stage of water below here remains very fair and boats are able to leave here with full cargoes. The Arkansas river contains three feet water in the channel, and falling slowly. The decline in Red river continues, and the channel is getting low.
