ALL TAXES shall become due on the first day of December of each year for which the tax is levied, and become delinquent on the first day of March, next after they become due.

ON PERSONAL PROPERTY a penalty of five per cent shall attach March first, and be charged upon all delinquent taxes, and thenceforth there shall be interest at the rate of ONE PER CENT PER MONTH UNTIL THE SAME IS PAID.

On or before the first day of September of each year, the County Treasurer shall make out a list of the unpaid delinquent personal property taxes in the same order as they appear on the tax list and shall notify by mail on or before September 15th each of the delinquents that unless same are paid on or before October 15th, the same will be placed in the hands of the Sheriff for collection, and if such taxes are not paid upon demand, he shall distrain sufficient goods and chattels belonging to the person, firm or corporation charged with such taxes, if found within the county, to pay the same, with the said penalty of five per cent, and all accruing interest and costs.

ON REAL ESTATE, penalty is added as follows: March first five per cent, June first two per cent, and November first three per cent, making ten per cent up to December first of each year. All land on which taxes are not paid, will be sold for said taxes on the SECOND DAY OF DECEMBER of each year and additional costs will be added for tax sales. Twelve per cent can be charged for three years when a tax deed can be issued.
