Man Found Dead.

The body of a dead man found last Tuesday on the prairie about six miles east of Williston, lying a few rods off the main traveled road. The face was considerably disfigured by being burned in a prairie fire which passed over that section of country a week or so ago. The body was without a coat or hat, but otherwise the man seemed to have been well dressed. There was nothing found on the body to indicate who the man was. He was probably 25 years old. About \$5 in money was found in the pockets. A telegram from Seattle intimates that the man may have been Charles Pfister or John Folk. Coroner Thomas took charge of the body and will hold an inquest to-day. The coroner thinks the body must have lain on the prairie since December, and from stories told it is thought that the man was some what demented, as several persons think they saw him during the winter.
