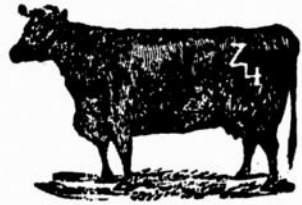

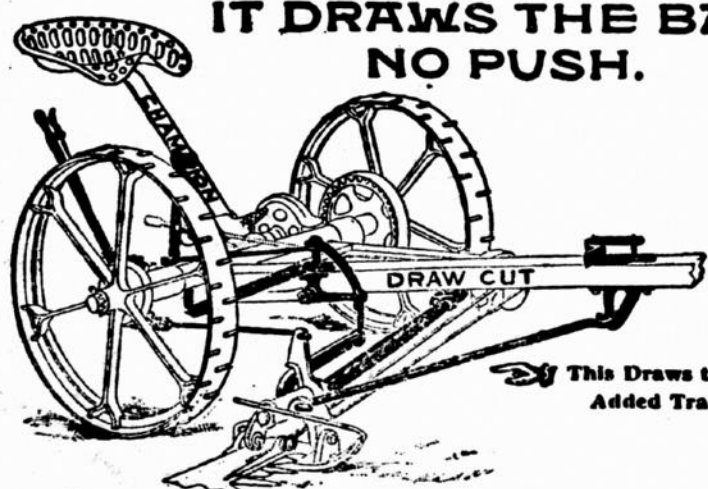

THE NEWS RESUME

EVENTS OF THE PAST WEEK IN A CONDENSED FORM.

Washington Notes.
Architects in Minneapolis, Duluth and Superior have been invited to submit designs for the proposed public building to be constructed in the last named city. The Superior building makes the third to be placed under the competitive plan.

The new battleships Mississippi and Idaho, 13,000 tons, retain the offensive and defensive features of first-class battleships at a sacrifice of speed, power and coal capacity. They will be of the type of the 16,000-ton battleship Connecticut.

The Korean minister has notified the state department that he will make representations in the case of Eui Wha, the Korean prince, who is a student at the Ohio Wesleyan university, and who was recently beaten by a rowdy wuffe returning from a theater at Delaware, Ohio.

James C. Monaghan, at present professor of the commercial department of the University of Wisconsin, and for twelve years in the consular service,

has been appointed by Secretary Cortelyou editor of the reports of the bureau of foreign commerce of the state department, which bureau is to be transferred to the department of commerce and labor July 1, and consolidated with the bureau of statistics.

The reports of agents indicate that if the treaty is defeated the States of Panama and Cacao, which occupy the Isthmus of Panama, will secede and organize an independent republic. In these two states sentiment in favor of the canal is almost unanimous, but it is feared that the opposition elsewhere in the country is so strong that the treaty will be defeated. President Marroquin is heartily in sympathy with those who desire the treaty to be ratified. He is hampered, however, by the strong sentiment that prevails outside of the isthmus, and even among his own ministry.

Casualties.

John Zelenka and wife, an aged couple at Montgomery, Minn., were instantly killed by being struck by the North Star Limited on the Minneapolis & St. Louis road.

Planters in East Carroll parish, La., neglected to repair the levees after the April flood, and now their crops are under water, due to the freshet in the Kansas and Missouri rivers.

As many persons were standing on the tracks of the Tacoma & Eastern at Kapowsin, Wash., a runaway train loaded with logs crashed into them, instantly killing A. B. Voorhees of Tacoma, formerly of Detroit, Mich., and fatally injuring John Bullen. Mrs. C. F. Forner was so seriously injured that she died within half an hour.

Crimes and Criminals.

Dr. T. J. Buchanan of Eastman, Ga., was shot and instantly killed by his son. The father had threatened to kill his wife and children.

In a quarrel with one of his stable hands at the Harlem race track in Chicago, Sidney S. Bender was struck with a pitchfork and so badly injured that he may die. His assailant, known as "Dutch," was arrested.

The preliminary hearing of C. Ellsworth Upton and Thomas W. McGregor, charged with complicity in the postoffice department frauds, took place at Baltimore. They were held to the grand jury.

Mrs. Mary McKnight of Kalkaska, Mich., the self-confessed murderess of her brother, John Murphy, and his wife and baby, is a picture of abject despair. Her attorney entered a plea of not guilty, and her examination was set for Aug. 17.

Armed with shotguns and rifles, the farmers and summer residents of Mount Kisco and Newcastle, N. Y., are looking for the incendiary who has set fire to more than a dozen houses and barns and poisoned almost every dog in two townships since the first of the year. The town board has offered a reward of \$1,000 for his capture and conviction.

James Dumas, proprietor of a transfer company, killed Sarah E. King, wife of Wesley D. King, a workman at the Adams & Wagon works at Indianapolis, and then committed suicide. The dead bodies were found by a daughter of the murdered woman. Dumas said at once that he had quarreled with his "woman," and was going to kill himself.

The building trades' lockout in New York is complete, and 150,000 laboring men are idle.

The cementworkers of America decided to hold their next meeting at St. Louis the first week in June, 1904.

At the 147th commencement of the University of Pennsylvania degrees were conferred upon nearly 500 graduates.

Gov. Bailey of Kansas has issued a proclamation calling together the legislature in special session to deal with the flood situation.

The next annual congress of the National Prison Association of the United States will be held in Louisville, Ky., Oct. 3 to 8.

The whaling ship Gjoa, with Capt. Amundsen's magnetic north pole expedition on board, sailed from Christiania, Norway, recently, at midnight.

W. C. Kitterman of Blokow, Mo., has invented an electrical rural mail delivery system which will be financed by capitalists of St. Joseph. It contemplates two boxes, for receipt and delivery.

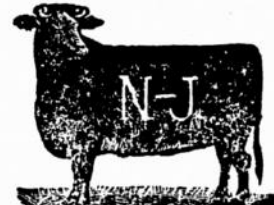

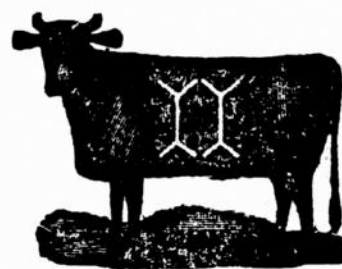
