FIREMEN LOSE LIVES AT FARGO

THE J. I. CASE BUILDING IS DESTROYED BY FLAMES WITH SAD RESULTS.

Falling Walls Kill William H. White, Hesse Cart Driver, and George M. Hartman, Newsielemen. Edmore Has Big Blaze.

Fargo, N. D., Nov. 19.—Two firemen killed and a property loss of \$200,000 resulted here from a fire which destroyed the plant of the J. I. Case Threshing Machine Co.

The fire originated in the engine room. No one was in the room at the time and the fire was not discovered until it had made considerable headway.

By the time the fire department was ready to make any effectual resistance the entire building, which is a five-story structure, was a mass of flames. The firemen stuck bravely to their posts and by heroic effort saved the buildings in the neighborhood.

Firemen White and Hartman, who lost their lives, were caught under falling walls. Death was instantaneous.

The building was second in size only to the International Harvester company's building and the loss of the structure and the machinery is total.

The agent paid \$50,000 in notes from the safe, but nothing else could be taken from the building.

The building was insured at the Case headquarters in Racine, Wis., and the loss is fully covered.

Edmore, N. D., Nov. 19.—A fire which broke out about midnight Sunday night destroyed property valued at \$28,500 before it was under control early today. A fierce northwest wind fanned the flames and made it almost impossible for the fire fighters to do anything.

The losses and insurance are as follows: Edmore Mercantile company, stock of \$40,000, with building of \$22,000; partial insurance. Tony La Brier, restaurant building, loss \$1,500; the restaurant, operated by John Miller, had a loss of \$500, about half insured. William Collins, harness shop and building, total loss of \$2,000, with half insurance. N. W. Hawkinson, building valued at \$900, half insured, occupied by Mrs. L. A. Evenson, milliner. J. H. Braund, loss \$7,000, one-third insured. Rosart Hardware Co., stock of \$10,000, with building valued at \$3,000, half insured.
